The Vandalia Sweet Treats Fest was held at the Vandalia Sports Complex on Saturday, May 10 with a great turnout. Everyone was invited to indulge their sweet tooth in a symphony of flavors! We had a variety of sweet treats, non-food vendors, live music, and other activities to enjoy!

On May 16th, the City hosted our annual shred day in the front parking lot of the Municipal Building. This event is always a great resource for our residents as they stop by to drop off sensitive documents and paperwork that we shred free-of-charge.



Additionally, we use this time to shred documents that have reached their public records retention expiration and clear space in the Municipal Building. A special "thanks" to Rich Hopkins for organizing this event



and all the departments who provided employees to assist residents in unloading their vehicles and carrying boxes of documents to the shred truck. This year, we filled two trucks with shredded paperwork.

Vandalia-Butler High School hosted a special Memorial Day Program on May 16th to honor our military veterans and pay tribute to the Vandalia-Butler graduates who paid the ultimate sacrifice in protecting our nation and defending our freedom. The students and staff do a great job in honoring our military as we approach Memorial Day. We appreciate the opportunity to attend the ceremony and have many representatives from the city present. Public Works crews installed Veteran banners, Purple Heart banners, and American flags in preparation of Memorial Day.



Public Works employees welcomed third grade students from Smith Intermediate School and St. Christopher School to the PW Garage for the annual Kids Days at PW. Kids were able to "drive" the street sweeper, raise/lower dump truck snowplows, ride up in the sign/lift truck, sit in various PW equipment, and learn about how we make street signs, our water distribution system, motorized sewer cameras operated by TCA (wastewater treatment plant), and generally learn about what public works employees do to keep the City operational during all seasons.

The Division of Police honored all fallen officers, including Lieutenant James E. Bohanan, during National Police Memorial Week May 12th through 16th. Police officers are remembered who died in the line of duty while serving their communities.

On May 19, we held a joint press conference with the Vandalia-Butler Chamber of Commerce and the CenterPoint Energy Air Show officials to announce details of the upcoming FlightFest being held on June 21 & 22 at the Sports Complex. This free, family-friendly event will be filled with an opportunity for people to meet the air show performers, visit food truck vendors, see a variety of static parade vehicles, and enjoy a concert by the Lt. Although the weather was less than conducive for ice cream, it was a special time to show our appreciation to our employees for the dedicated service they provide each week.



We have seven businesses registered for the 37th Annual Corporate Challenge scheduled for June 2-6. The Corporate Challenge consists of various games, challenges, and friendly competitions with teams from local businesses and government entities each evening of the week. Participating businesses include GE Aerospace, Johnson Electric, Inteva Products, Lincotek Medical, Kentner Sellers CPAs, PSA Airlines, and City of Vandalia. We are looking forward to another excellent event.

We have scheduled this year's Neighborhood Beautification Day event. It will take place on the morning of Saturday, June 7th from 8:00 am to noon. Ben Graham has coordinated the event and secured Rumpke to assist as well as volunteers from GE Aviation. Ben has distributed flyers to all residents in the area, notifying them of the event and letting them know they can sign up for assistance from our group of volunteers to spruce up their properties. A flyer for the event is attached.

ACM Cron and Public Services Director Borton attended a grant review meeting for the Dayton International Airport Northeast Logistics Access (Ring Road) project. The project was submitted for ODOT Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) funding for the Construction phase at \$17.6 million. Previous phases (Preliminary Engineering, Detailed Design, Right-of-Way Acquisition) were funded at 80% federal/20% local. The 20% local is being split generally at 70% Montgomery County Engineer Office (MCEO)/30% City due to the project limits within each jurisdiction. **After grants and project split, the City is projected to pay only ~\$1.1 million** of this roughly \$28 million total project cost, which will improve the roadway, drainage, and add a shared use path from Inverness Ave to the Chewy facility on Lightner Rd.

During the past two weeks, VPD officers made six traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations while working eight additional enforcement hours. These stops resulted in three citations and three written warnings. An additional five stops were conducted on commercial vehicles during regular patrol hours, resulting in four citations and one written warning. During regular patrol an additional 170 passenger vehicles were stopped, resulting in 43 citations, 121 written and 13 verbal warnings.

- I attended the I-70/75 Economic Development monthly meeting on May 16th. This month's speaker was Lance Oaks from Oak Tree Development. His presentation was very informative, speaking about the residential housing development in the Dayton region and discussing the importance of new residential developments to the region to be able to support the workforce demands with the recent proposed business development.
- Angela Swartz and I attended Montgomery County's Business First meeting held at their newly renovated Madison Lakes facility. There were two presenters at this month's event. Kennedy Dennard from the Ohio Department of Veterans Services gave an update on programs and assistance available to help our veterans enter the workforce. Jennifer DeFrancesco, Dayton VA's Medical Director, provided an overview of all of the great things the Dayton V.A. can offer our Veterans.

- We met with CenterPoint Energy representatives about some of their ongoing and upcoming gas main replacements. They are in the early stages of planning for a large transmission main replacement in the western portion of the city. This major project is tentatively scheduled for 2028-2029.
- Ocity Manager office staff met for one last time in preparation for the Air Show weekend. Invitations were mailed out last week. Volunteers have been secured for registration and shuttling our guests to the chalet. Transportation has been confirmed and we will hold a volunteer driver meeting on Friday, June 13th to go over the details with drivers.
- Several staff members met with WDC Group to review the progress of the engineering and design of the new Public Works Facility at 810 Northwoods Boulevard. Our goal is to have the project designed and ready to put out for bid late this fall.
- Mike Hammes, Ben Graham and I met with a potential residential developer to discuss their ideas for a new development in the city.
- I am attending the Dayton Area Managers Association meeting on Friday. We are continuing our discussion from last month on ways to re-energize the group and foster more participation and engagement from members.
- You and I met with Kathryn Holbrook from AES Ohio. Kathryn is the new community connector for our area taking over for Holly Wiggins who has retired.
- Planning Commission met on May 13th to consider a rezoning at 3320 Benchwood Road from Residential Singel Family (RSF-1) to Highway Business (HB). 3320 Benchwood is the last remaining residentially zoned property on Benchwood Road. Planning Commission recommended approval of the rezoning.
- The Board of Zoning Appeals met on May 14th to consider a variance for minimum lot frontage on the property being developed as "The Landing" at 650 Pool Avenue. The developer and builder have decided to build the structures on separate lots instead of their original plan to have all buildings on the same lot. The Board recommended approval of the variance.
- The Board of Zoning Appeals will meet on June 11th to consider a variance for the total accessory structure area at 842 Donora Drive.
- City Planner Mike Hammes participated in the Coalition of Age-Friendly Communities meeting.
- Staff has condemned the property at 911 Stewville Drive after the recent fire at that location.
- Corporate Challenge is just around the corner, beginning next Monday. Rich Hopkins is actively recruiting team members to fill all of the events. This year's corporate Challenge will take place Monday through Friday next week.
- We held our first Employee Appreciation event, an Ice Cream Social, on Wednesday, May 28 at the Sports Complex.
- Rich Hopkins will be finishing up the taping of June's Focus Vandalia videos next week. Topics for June will be the Vandalia Flight Fest, Star Spangled Celebration, Police Open House, Pollinators Week and the Mobile Sensory Unit.

Mental Health

Talking about depression, anxiety or other issues that may affect your mental health isn't always easy. But you're not alone. Millions of people in the U.S. are affected by mental health issues each year. So let's start the conversation. Learning how to talk about and understand the mental health challenges you or a loved one may be facing may be the first step. Then, you may learn ways to cope and start feeling better.

Understanding Mental Health

Mental health describes conditions that may affect your emotional, psychological and social wellbeing. When we talk about mental health, it includes anxiety, depression or other conditions. Mental health may also include things like substance use, eating disorders or psychiatric conditions like schizophrenia, in which people perceive reality abnormally and may have hallucinations or delusions. We tend to think of mental health as part of the larger picture of our overall behavioral health.

What can cause mental health challenges?

Each person has their own story. Mental health challenges may come up any time, and at any age – even in children. Mental health may be tied to social or emotional experiences. Sometimes, mental health issues can result from past abuse or trauma. Family history, certain medical conditions or a brain disorder may also impact your likelihood of having a mental health condition.

Taking care of your mental health is important for your overall health. Your emotional state may impact your physical health, too. If you're struggling, seeking treatment may help you feel better so you can live a healthier life.

What are common behavioral health signs to look for?

Some mental health signs may be easy to spot — and some may be harder to notice than others. Mental health is complex, and signs differ for each condition or person. If you see some of these signs, it may be your signal that it's time to get help.

- Eating or sleeping too much or not enough
- Excessive worrying or fear
- Extreme mood changes
- Difficulty perceiving what's real and what isn't
- Inability to do daily activities or handle everyday stress
- Losing interest in people and activities
- Overuse of alcohol or drugs
- Strong feelings of irritability or anger
- Thoughts of harming oneself or others
- Thoughts of suicide
- Unexplained, ongoing aches and pains

What kind of support can mental health counseling offer?

Mental health and behavioral health specialists can help you cope with concerns like:

- Depression
- Anxiety or stress
- Alcohol or substance abuse
- Anger management
- Grief or loss
- Marital problems
- Domestic violence
- Eating disorders
- Compulsive spending or gambling

Exercise and Mental Health

It isn't often we find a no cost (and fun!) treatment for medical conditions — but there are many easy and affordable mood-boosting activities that are proven to help support mental health. (Things like meditation, journaling, social interaction or listening to music, for example.) All of this happens behind the scenes during and after a workout to help support a healthy mind. The result? Well, exercise can bring on a lot of positive things, like:

- Better sleep
- Less stress
- Improved mood
- Increased energy
- Reduced tiredness and that can help increase mental alertness

What exercises can I do to improve my mental health?

It's almost impossible to go through life without feeling blue every now and then. After all, we live with stressors every single day. If you're looking to improve your mental health, getting up and moving around may be one of the best medicines. And here's a hint — there are no right or wrong exercises to help with anxiety, depression or stress. The key to an effective activity is finding one you like to do. Grab a friend, get moving, and get those endorphins pumping

CASSEL HILLS GOLF COURSE

- Capital Electric was able to get the electric to the irrigation pumps taken care of last week.
 This allowed our existing irrigation system to be up and running for the season.
- Pro Pump and Controlls completed the new irrigation pump panel installation that is part of the overall irrigation system project. Tim Bailey is adjusting our control satellites and hydraulics on the golf course.
- Golf Course maintenance staff fertilized the greens in early May and applied fungicides to the greens on May 15. The course is in great shape for the summer season.
- Commerical Irrigation and Turf, the contractor for the irrigation system project, has indicated they plan to mobilize and begin construction at Cassel Hills in early July. Golf staff will be communicating with golfers in advance of any hole closures during the project.

- During the past two weeks, VPD officers made six traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations while working eight additional enforcement hours. These stops resulted in three citations and three written warnings. An additional five stops were conducted on commercial vehicles during regular patrol hours, resulting in four citations and one written warning. During regular patrol an additional 170 passenger vehicles were stopped, resulting in 43 citations, 121 written and 13 verbal warnings.
- 2. SSM Wright attended the Motorola Summit Conference during the week of May 12. This conference focused on the technology used by VPD's Public Safety Specialists for both dispatching and record-keeping purposes as well as new software available for officers and dispatchers.
- 3. On May 14, VPD officers assisted with an emergency evacuation drill at St. Christopher School.
- 4. During the week of May 12, VPD sworn staff completed their annual range qualifications at the MCSO Range. This training was done during normal shift rotations to reduce training overtime and ensure proper road coverage during the week.
- 5. On May 12 and 13, Officer Blackford attended "Criminal Patrol" training in Sidney.

On May 16 in recognition of Police Week, Stonespring Skilled Nursing Facility
provided the entire Division with lunch from Raising Cane's. Several other
organizations and individuals dropped off cookies and other treats throughout the

week.

- 7. On May 16, Chief Sucher and Captain Walker took part in a table-top mass casualty incident scenario as part of our ongoing public safety training strategy. The upcoming Flight Fest layout was used as an example and items learned will be put to use for future briefings and emergency response planning.
- 8. On May 16, Chief Sucher and Captain Walker attended the Vandalia-Butler High School Memorial service. This service honors those Vandalia-Butler service members who have been killed in action serving our country.
- 9. On May 19 and 20, Detective Coatsworth attended "Tech Threats and Trends" training in Centerville.
- 10. On May 19, Kailyn Overman was sworn in as VPD's newest police officer. She has previous experience with Jackson Center PD and Botkins PD. Her ceremonial swearing in took place at the City Council meeting that evening.
- 11. Beginning on May 21, officers with VPD provided law enforcement support in Dayton for the Spring Session of the NATO Parliamentary Assembly. There were no significant responses during the event.
- 12. In May 21, Chief Sucher, Captain Walker, and Sergeant Krimm met with consultants from OACP to design the assessment center for the current sergeant promotional process.
- 13. On May 21, Chief Sucher and Captain Walker attended the memorial service for retired police officer Mike Kimbrel. Mike retired from VPD in 2024 with more than 25 years of police service.
- 14. On May 22, Chief Sucher and Captain Walker met with VFD personnel and the Chamber of Commerce to finalize details for the Flight Fest operational plans.
- 15. On May 23, Chief Sucher sat on a COPTALK panel for the Police Executive Leadership College in Dublin.
- 16. On May 27, VFD utilized the VPD training room for in-service training.
- 17. On May 28, Chief Sucher and Sergeant Nagel attended a meeting with airshow staff regarding Flight Fest coordination.
- 18. On May 28, Chief Sucher met with Chief Porter, BTPD, and South Community management to interview one of the two Mobile Crisis Responder candidates for our MCR program.
- 19. On May 28 and 29, Detective Estepp attended the "Law Enforcement Drug Summit" at THE Ohio State University.

Development & Engineering Services (DES)

<u>Dog Leg Water and Sanitary Extension Phase 2 project:</u> All components for the sanitary lift station have been installed. This project is waiting on AES to set the electrical meter, so the station can be tested and commissioned into service.

Vandalia Bikeway Connector project: Brumbaugh Construction has completed both Mechanically Stabilized Earth (MSE) walls near the Taylorsville Dam and railroad tracks and is pouring the coping (concrete wall cap). Brumbaugh is trying to schedule CSX flaggers for the setting of the new bridge, which will cause a 3-day closure of US-40 between the railroad tracks and S Brown School Rd. Meanwhile, Security Fence continued working on the foundations for the new traffic signal mast arms and pedestrian pedestals at the National Rd/Brown School Rd and S Brown School Rd/Cassel Creek Dr/Scholz Dr intersections.

<u>2025 Curb/Sidewalk project:</u> Coate Construction has completed work in the Ashbury Farms neighborhood with Lancer Ave, Rader Dr, and Jan Ave to finish this year's project. Coate anticipates completing all work by 6/13, before Air Show.

Kenneth Avenue Watermain Replacement & Resurfacing project: Sturm Construction completed the sanitary sewer work in the curve and has installed all the new water services from Larry Ave to Virginia Ave.

<u>Tionda, Mossview, Ranchview (TMR) Watermain Replacement & Resurfacing project:</u> M&T Excavating has installed ~800 feet of new water main along S Tionda Dr, starting from S Dixie Dr, and is currently testing this section.

<u>2025 Sanitary Sewer Lining project:</u> Insight Pipe Contracting has completed the initial cleaning of these sanitary sewer mains. Insight Pipe will come back later in the summer to install the new linings.

<u>2025 Street Resurfacing:</u> Barrett Paving Materials plans to start the milling and subsequent paving work after Air Show.

- Certificate of Occupancy (CO) issued: Dayton Metro Pickleball at 6213 Miller Lane for tenant upfit of existing building
- Temporary Certificate of Occupancy (TCO) issued: CrossFit Excess at 267 W National Rd for the new gym build
- Another new home building permit issued: 707 Deerhurst Dr
- Various new home builds under construction & inspection in Foxfire Section 9 (now 11 of the 29 lots)
- Footing excavations adjacent to City sanitary sewer: Living Work Church at 926 E National Rd
- Final fire alarm inspection completed: Basic Vitamin at 300 Corporate Center Dr
- Final fire alarm inspection completed: Carter Express at 1655 Capstone Way

As part of Ohio Department of Transportation's (ODOT) traffic count program (performed roughly every 3 years), Eggeman Engineering & Consulting will be deploying counting units for roughly 2-3 days each on the following roadways within the City:

- US-40 (8 counts)
- Dayton International Airport Access Rd (2 counts)
- National Rd (1 count)
- Cassel Rd (1 count)
- I-70 & I-75 ramps (tube counts)

As part of Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission's (MVRPC) annual traffic count program, OAKS Engineering will be deploying video counting units on poles at the following roadways within the City this year (map attached). Locations are recounted every 3 years:

- Dog Leg Rd
- Peters Pk
- Helke Rd
- Dixie Dr (2 counts at 2 locations)

I attended the MVRPC May Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) meeting.

Assistant City Manager (ACM) Cron, DES staff, and Fire Marshal Jacobs met for our monthly development meeting to discuss ongoing and proposed projects, ensuring all parties remain aligned and informed.

ACM Cron and I attended a grant review meeting for the Dayton International Airport Northeast Logistics Access (Ring Road) project. The project was submitted for ODOT Transportation Review Advisory Council (TRAC) funding for the Construction phase at \$17.6 million. Previous phases (Preliminary Engineering, Detailed Design, Right-of-Way Acquisition) were funded at 80% federal/20% local. The 20% local is being split generally at 70% Montgomery County Engineer Office (MCEO)/30% City due to the project limits within each jurisdiction. **After grants and project split, the City is projected to pay only ~\$1.1 million of this roughly \$28 million total project cost**, which will improve the roadway, drainage, and add a shared use path from Inverness Ave to the Chewy facility on Lightner Rd.

DES staff met with CenterPoint Energy about an upcoming large transmission line replacement project slated for construction in 2028-2029.

Northern Area Water Authority (NAWA) -water supply treatment:

PW Superintendent Hayslett and I attended the NAWA Outfall Channel project 50% drawing review meeting for the plant's new outfall to the Great Miami River.

I attended the NAWA board meeting with yourself, Finance Director Leiter, and ACM Cron.

<u>Tri-Cities North Regional Wastewater Authority (TCA) – wastewater treatment:</u>

Public Works (PW) Superintendent Hayslett and I attended the monthly TCA technical committee meeting.

I attended the online bid opening for the TCA Mud Run Relief Sewer project to observe how an electronic bidding platform is used during the process.

DES & PW staff joined fellow City staff members to perform the annual Shred Day service for residents.

Public Works (PW)

New Public Works Facility (810 Northwoods Blvd): Chief Building Official (CBO) Mastrino, ACM Cron, PW Superintendent Hayslett, and I met to discuss the new facility. We plan to meet again with WDC Group to review the current design this Friday.

Streets:

Crews continued right-of-way (ROW) trimming of brush and vegetation along streets with the Trackless machine.

Crews filled potholes on N Dixie Dr, Airport Access Rd, and other various locations throughout town.

Crews installed Veteran banners, Purple Heart banners, and American flags in preparation of Memorial Day.

Crews completed the installing and wiring for the new set of rectangular rapid flashing beacons (RRFB) for the crosswalk on Stonequarry Rd at Helke Rd.

Storm Sewer:

Crews fixed sinkholes starting to form near 267 W National Rd and 791 Deer Creek Dr due to issues with existing storm pipes and patched the roadways.

Crews continued to sweep the streets to remove debris from the curb gutters and prevent materials from being washed into the storm sewer during storm events.

Crews continued repairing catch basins on roadways planned for resurfacing this year.

Water:

Crews continued installing new water meters inside residences/businesses and outside in meter pits. Crews also passed out notices to residents who need to call the Water Division of the Finance Department to schedule the replacement of their inside water meter.

Crews replaced a broken main valve on S Tionda Dr old water main needed for the TMR project and fixed a water main break in the old main damaged by the removal of some unknown water service lines to the old Police Station at the current Seger Park.

Crews started fixing fire hydrants issues reported by the Fire Division during their annual hydrant flushing of the water mains and inspections.

Sanitary Sewer:

Crews performed monthly sanitary sewer lift station maintenance: making sure pumps are working correctly, pump float balls are cleaned, and documenting hourly pump reads.

Other Services:

Crews welcomed third grade students from Smith Intermediate School and St. Christopher School to the PW Garage for the annual Kids Days at PW. Kids were able to drive the street sweeper, raise/lower dump truck snowplows, ride up in the sign/lift truck, sit in various PW equipment, and learn about how we make street signs, our water distribution system, motorized sewer cameras operated by TCA (wastewater treatment plant), and generally learn about what we do to keep the City running.

Crews staffed the monthly large item debris drop-off event at the PW garage. This free service is available to residents on the second Saturday of each month from March through October, between 8am and 2pm.



Crews poured the concrete for the last of the Spring placement of monument foundations at Poplar Hill cemetery and backfilled around all new monument foundations.

Crews performed 2 burials at Poplar Hill cemetery during this period.


Crews performed 106 utility locates this period for Ohio 811.
