Mayor Herbst & City Councilmembers:

The past month has been filled with many fun-filled activities and events in Vandalia. It has been great to see the community's excitement and involvement in various activities and enjoying the summer weather while getting out to meet neighbors, support local businesses, and enjoy the City's great amenities.

On Thursday, June 19<sup>th</sup>, the City hosted *Stars*, *Stripes*, *and Songs* at the new amphitheater with the U.S. Air Force's *Band of Flight* performing a variety of musical tunes to entertain attendees. These talented musicians who serve our military and are stationed at Wright-Patt AFB perform dozens of concerts annually while travelling to various military bases and community events. There were approximately 250 in attendance at this engaging concert, and we look forward to keeping them as an annual performer.

Air Show weekend kicked off with FlightFest at the Sports Complex on Friday and Saturday, June 20<sup>th</sup> & 21<sup>st</sup>. FlightFest was a collaboration between the Chamber, Air Show officials, and the City. Friday evening's event featured food trucks, vendors, the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds pilots and crew staff, other air show performers, and a special appearance by the Lt. Dan Band, featuring Gary Sinise, with nearly 4,000 in attendance. Saturday evening's event featured music by the band Pulse. We received many positive comments from the community and attendees commenting on how much they enjoyed this event. There were no major issues, disturbances, injuries, or medical emergencies during the festivities.

Although air show weekend dealt us with hot temperatures this year, we enjoyed a wonderful event with various military and air show performers performing a spectacular show. Special thanks to our police, fire, and public works employees who worked extra hours to provide support, protection, and assistance for the event over the weekend.

On Friday, June 27<sup>th</sup>, the City hosted the Chamber's annual Food Truck Rally at the Sports Complex for another great event for families and guests to participate in. Although the weather was not the most conducive, there were still plenty of fun times with various food options and other enjoyable activities.



On July 3<sup>rd</sup>, the City hosted the annual Star-Spangled Celebration at the Sports Complex featuring food trucks, music, vendors, and a spectacular fireworks show. The Fire Division worked closely with Rozzi's Fireworks during set-up and inspections. There were no major incidents or issues during the evening's festivities and the crowd enjoyed the fireworks. Special thanks to Butler Township and supporting partners, including Airport Toyota, Smedley's Chevrolet, Beau Townsend Ford, Fifth-Third Bank, Digital Cowboy, and Pickrel, Schaeffer, & Ebeling in making this one of the region's best Independence celebrations.

I want to thank Council and staff for participating in Monday evening's Council Retreat. We had an evening packed with updates on our bike path extension project, a Fire Training facility, the new Public Works Facility, the Tri-Cities upcoming construction project, utility rates review, updates to the City's Personnel & Policy Manual, residential development projects, and a presentation by Synergy. I appreciate the feedback and comments from Council in providing support and direction on these projects.

On Tuesday morning, July 8<sup>th</sup>, fire crews were dispatched to a possible structure fire on Stop Eight Road. Crews arrived to find no fire but quickly determined the incident was a hazardous materials leak. Dayton Regional Haz-Mat was requested and responded to the scene to mitigate a hydrochloric acid leak within the building. Vandalia Fire crews along with multiple mutual aid companies and police set up a safety zone and traffic restrictions in the area that were in effect for approximately five hours.

Brumbaugh Construction installed the new bridge over the CSX rail lines during the 3-day closure of US-40 over Taylorsville dam. Brumbaugh also completed the final grade and seeded by the MetroPark's north dam parking lot. Security Fence is waiting on AES to set the meter for the new traffic signals power at the National Rd/Brown School Rd intersection before they can use the new system. The old traffic signal poles and mast arms will be taken down and reassembled at S. Brown School Rd/Cassel Creek Dr/Scholz Dr intersection.



Ohio HB 96 recently passed and includes requirements for cities to formally adopt a cybersecurity plan. I.T. Director Davey is working to update our current cybersecurity and disaster recovery plan and get additional input from departments in September. After the plan is updated, we will submit the plan to City Council for approval.



Congratulations to Chad Baughman as being selected for this month's Employee Spotlight.



- I attended the MVRMA Board meeting on June 23<sup>rd</sup>. It was discussed at the meeting the path going forward with Mark Wending, the Executive Director, announcing his retirement. We also discussed the desire of another community to join MVRMA.
- You and I attended the Tri Cities Wastewater Authority monthly board meeting on June 25. The CMAR contractor for the plant improvement was there to give a short presentation of where we are with the project to date.
- I met with Ohio Ecomomic Development Association's president & CEO, David Zak to give him an update on things going on in Vandalia and more specifically our economic development efforts and programs. <u>Click here</u> to see their post on LinkedIn about his visit.

- Ben Borton and I participated in a joint meeting with Montgomery County Engineer's Office, Montgomery County TID, Miami County Engineer, Butler Township, City of Union and Monroe Township to discuss many of the ongoing and proposed roadway and development projects surrounding the airport. We plan to meet monthly just to keep everyone updated and on the samp page as we all try to encourage development but also try to minimize the impact to roadways and our residents.
- Ben Lickliter and I met with representatives from Hampton Golf to discuss our golf course operations. They spent a couple days here at Cassel Hills to provide an evaluation of our entire operations. We look forward to hearing what they have to say in their report.
- You and I met with Patrick Schwartz from Highbridge Consulting. Patrick gave us an update on many legislative items at the state level and we also discussed the potential to submit our Public Works Facility as a project for some potential funding in next year's Sate Capital Budget.
- We also met with State Representative Rodney Creech to discuss our Public Works Facility funding, asking for his support. I also took Mr. Creech on a tour of our existing facility and the site for our new complex.
- Thank you for the opportunity to participate in the City Council Retreat this past Monday. This less formal setting is a great way to share things with City Council to get some feedback and direction on upcoming issues and projects. We have a lot of exciting opportunities coming up and it is great to see the support from City Council.
- We continue to meet with WDC Group to review the progress of the engineering and design of the new Public Works Facility at 810 Northwoods Boulevard. Meetings are scheduled every two weeks to answer questions and keep the project on schedule. Our goal is still to have the project out for bid and award a contact in late 2025.
- You and I attended the Dayton Development Coalition's Regional Economic Development Forum this week held a GE Aviation's facility in Beavercreek. The Dayton Region continues its momentum in economic development with many projects already in progress or projected for the near future.
- I met with two separate companies these past two weeks that have interest in the large facility at 1669 Capstone Way. Several inquires have come in within the past couple months.
- The Planning Commission met on July 8<sup>th</sup> to review four items that will be moving forward to the next Council Study Session on July 21<sup>st</sup>.
  - 1. PUD Amendment & Final Plan for Redwood Phase 3 on Park Center Drive.
  - 2. PUD Rezoning & Preliminary Plan for Residential Development on Corporate Center Drive.
  - 3. Rezoning at 3675 Wyse Road from Office/Industrial Park to Highway Business and Industrial.
- 4. Conditional Use at 3675 Wyse Road for Truck Facility in Industrial District.
- Mike Hammes, Ben Graham, Ben Borton and I met with developer for the Foxfire Subdivision. We discussed their proposal for moving forward with Section 8 of the development. Seventeen of the twenty-nine lots in Section 9 have been issued building permits with several homes already completed.

- Recently, our area has been under a heat advisory. The Division of Fire has taken to social media to remind the community to be weather aware, to stay cool and to stay safe.
   The Division of Fire social media posts will have useful information on recognizing heat emergencies and when to call 911.
- 2. The Division of Fire participated at the Dayton Air Show and the festivities leading up to the show weekend. #### **FACILITY MAINTENANCE DIVISION**

- 1. Parks staff is non-stop mowing, rains so far this year have contributed to a lot of grass growth. Seasonal staff is doing a great job helping us keep up.
- 2. Staff ran the northeast roof drain stormwater drain at the Clubhouse. They also removed several areas of roots and it is flowing correctly now.
- 3. We had some AES power issues which required staff to check and reset some of our HVAC equipment, timers etc.
- 4. Parks Staff is in the process of completing the soil work around the new Robinette Park playground. The playground installation contractor is completing the punch list today. Turf installer is scheduled Thursday and Friday to complete the turf and mound install.
- 5. Even with all the rain, new trees require the root ball to be watered as needed. We have been watering street trees and other newly planted trees as needed.
- 6. With the rain, comes weeds in our landscape bed areas. Crews have been working to keep all our landscape beds in good condition. We applied mulch to some of our bed areas at the sports complex prior to the recent special events.

- 1. During the past three weeks, VPD officers made 11 traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations. These stops resulted in four traffic citations and seven written warnings while working eight additional enforcement hours.
- 2. Flight Fest took place on June 20 and 21, with the first night being a large event including the Thunderbirds pilots, the Lt. Dan Band with actor, Gary Sinise, and other air show performers. Though over 10,000 people registered online for the event, there were no major issues, disturbances, injuries, or medical emergencies.
- 3. VPD handled traffic and parking for the air show on June 21-22 without incident.
- 4. On June 24, Chief Sucher participated in the first round of interviews for the City's new Parks & Recreation Director.
- 5. Detectives charged a 33-year-old male subject for Strangulation. The male suspect was an acquaintance of the female and strangled her during sexual intercourse. The female lost consciousness twice and had several visible injuries to her neck, throat, and face. The male suspect was arrested and transported to the Montgomery County Jail.
- 6. On June 26, the Division hosted the assessment center portion of the promotional process for the next sergeant.
- 7. Chief Sucher attended the second round of interviews for police sergeant during the week of June 30.
- 8. On July 1, Luke Mitchell started his internship at the Vandalia Police Department. He will be with us during the month of July. Luke is a Vandalia Butler graduate and plays football for the University of Dayton. Luke will be exposed to how the police department works.
- 9. On July 2, Officer Sommer participated in a Focus Vandalia video for the upcoming National Night Out.

- 10. On July 3, Captain Walker and Officers Christian, Fraley, Myers, Stelzer, and Stout worked the Star-Spangled Celebration at the sports complex. Due to the detonation of a device in a trash barrel in a neighboring community, VPD's officers attended a joint briefing with VFD to communicate standards and plans in the event of a possible large-scale critical incident. There were no significant events or traffic issues, and all vehicles exited the complex by 10:45 p. m.
- 11. Detectives charged a 32-year-old subject for Unauthorized Use of a Vehicle. The male suspect took his ex-girlfriend's car keys and vehicle without her consent while visiting her son at 7575 Poe Avenue.
- 12. On July 7, Chief Sucher participated in the City Council Retreat.
- 13. On July 9, Captain Walker attended a leadership meeting in Miamisburg where local law enforcement command staff collaborated on shared interests & current events.

#### **Development & Engineering Services (DES)**

<u>Dog Leg Water and Sanitary Extension Phase 2 project:</u> During the commissioning process, some components were found to not communicate as they should with other components of the sanitary lift station. Those "issue" components were changed out and the lift station is now operational.

Vandalia Bikeway Connector project: Brumbaugh Construction installed the new bridge over the CSX rail lines during the 3-day closure of US-40 over Taylorsville dam. Brumbaugh also final graded and seeded by the MetroPark's north dam parking lot. Security Fence is waiting on AES to set the meter for the new traffic signals power at the National Rd/Brown School Rd intersection before they can use the new system. The old traffic signal poles and mast arms will then be taken down and reassembled at S Brown School Rd/Cassel Creek Dr/Scholz Dr intersection.



Kenneth Avenue Watermain Replacement & Resurfacing project: Sturm Construction connected the new water main to the existing main at Larry Ave/Kenneth Ave and subsequently decommissioned the old water main. Sturm has been working on concrete curb & sidewalk repairs and soil restoration. Sturm is planning to mill & pave Kenneth Ave late-July to early-August.

<u>Tionda, Mossview, Ranchview (TMR) Watermain Replacement & Resurfacing project:</u> M&T Excavating has new water main installed on all of Tionda Dr and to the north side of National Rd. All this new main has been filled, tested, and received passing results. M&T has started connecting the new main to other existing crossing water mains and new services to residences.

<u>2025 Sanitary Sewer Lining project:</u> Insight Pipe Contracting has completed the sewer main lining work for this year's project. Their chemical grouting subcontractor will perform the grouting of service laterals into the main at a later date.

<u>2025 Street Resurfacing:</u> Barrett Paving Materials has milled all the streets for this year's project. Barrett plans to complete the paving work by the middle of next week with final thermoplastic striping, traffic signal loop repairs, and raising of manhole (MH) lids & water main valve box lids to follow.

Eggeman Engineering & Consulting continues performing traffic counts for the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) throughout town (zero cost to City). These could be seen as black hoses stretched across the roadways attached to counting devices.

As part of our water tower maintenance contract, USG Water has started preparing the outside of the Inverness Ave water tower for a new exterior paint coating. With this new coating, the new City branding will be updated, making this the first water tower in the City with the new logo. In preparation for this work, Public Works (PW) crews drained the tower. The City can maintain adequate water pressure and supply utilizing only 2 of the 3 City water towers with close monitoring & support from NAWA.





During this period, I met with multiple residents to review and discuss the current drainage on their properties. It is worth reminding residents that **direct discharge of water (from gutters, etc.) onto a neighboring property is not allowed in the City**. With the large amount of rainfall in short storms we have been experiencing this spring/summer, some residents have been trying to alleviate their problems by discharging the water away and accidentally causing more problems for neighbors.

I participated in the first-round interviews for the new Parks & Recreation (P&R) Director.

Construction Inspector Games and I attended an ODOT pre-construction meeting for the emergency repairs to the Stop Eight Rd bridge from the bridge hit this past autumn.

Assistant City Manager (ACM) Cron and I attended a Miami/Montgomery County Coordination meeting to discuss the ongoing infrastructure improvement projects around the airport.

I met with JP Mohler to discuss a potential new revenue stream for the City through filing for a refund on the State's excise fuel tax. Our bulk fuel used for City vehicles is already federal tax-free but does include some State tax that is potentially refundable for certain specialized equipment (Fire apparatus, Police patrol cruisers, large PW vehicles, etc.).

DES staff met with P&R staff and OHM Advisors to discuss and help finalize the Robinette Splashpad project documents.

I met with American StructurePoint to discuss the results of this year's bridge inspections in the City, through their contract with ODOT (zero cost to City).

DES & PW staff have held numerous internal meetings in preparation for the upcoming budget season. Engineering/GIS Technician Baughman and I met with Choice One Engineering to look at some potential stormwater and sanitary projects to address issues found during inspections.

#### Northern Area Water Authority (NAWA) – water supply treatment:

Public Works (PW) Superintendent Hayslett and I coordinated with NAWA in preparations for the next round of 3-year testing for lead & copper requirements.

<u>Tri-Cities North Regional Wastewater Authority (TCA) – wastewater treatment:</u>

PW Superintendent Hayslett and I attended the monthly TCA technical committee meeting.

#### Public Works (PW)

#### New Public Works Facility (810 Northwoods Blvd):

Chief Building Official (CBO) Mastrino, ACM Cron, PW Superintendent Hayslett, IT Manager Davey, Electrical/Building Inspector Martin, and I continue to meet with WDC Group, Choice One Engineering, and other subconsultants on a 2-3 week basis to discuss the new facility and assist with the development of the final design. The plan is to have this project out for bid this autumn and construction to start soon after.

#### Streets:

Crews fixed the manhole (MH) at National Rd/Foley Dr; the MH riser was offset and the blocks below the casting were deteriorated. Crews did a good job pouring 8 cubic yards (CY) of low strength mortar (LSM) around the MH and installing new concrete riser rings under the MH casting. This work with finished with recycled asphalt to the roadway surface using our hot box trailer.

Crews also fixed a MH on National Rd, across from Larry Ave, by installing new concrete riser rings under the MH casting, resetting the casting/lid, and topping with recycled asphalt to the roadway surface.

Crews removed concrete around a few MHs on Stoney Springs Rd that was deteriorating. This allowed Barrett Paving to put asphalt directly around the MH for a better finished roadway surface.

Crews repaired a catch basin (CB) and replaced some sections of curb/gutter on Little York Rd. Crews did a great job with handling traffic control and flagging around the work at this tight location on a high traffic roadway.

Crews finished spraying around guardrail and began spraying curb gutters as part of our annual herbicide program. Crews started on the east side of the City and are working west.

#### Storm Sewer:

Crews investigated a sinkhole on Stoney Springs Rd by hydro-excavating down to the concrete storm pipe. Crews found an offset joint and were able to pour concrete around the pipe to seal it and prevent the sinkhole.

A sinkhole on Elva Ct was reported and coned/barreled to prevent drivers from hitting it. Crews have started hydro-excavating to locate the issue near the large 72" storm pipe under the roadway.

Crews continue to sweep the streets to remove debris from the curb gutters and prevent materials from being washed into the storm sewer during storm events.

#### Water:

Crews did a great job installing new 1-1/2" water meters on S Brown School Rd for multiple apartment buildings. These larger meters are more difficult to install and are located in old outside meter pits which make for hard working conditions. Crews also installed a new 3" meter at Adare Pharmaceutical and continued installing new water meters inside residences.

Crews performed the monthly water shut-offs of delinquent water accounts for the Water division of the Finance department (70 this month).

Crews fixed a water main break at the well house in Taylorsville MetroPark for the golf course irrigation system. Crews did a great job cutting out old valves and installed a repair clamp on the 10" water main.

#### Sanitary Sewer:

Crews performed monthly sanitary sewer lift station maintenance: making sure pumps are working correctly, pump float balls are cleaned, and documenting pump hours.

#### Other Services:

Crews installed & removed signage, barricades, and No Parking signs for the Air Show, Flight Fest, and Star-Spangled Celebration.

Crews came in to set up/tear down cones on Northwoods Blvd in the morning & afternoon each day of the Air Show and were on-call/ready to help whenever the Police Division needed.

Crews installed Star-Spangled Celebration banners and American flags for the 4<sup>th</sup> of July holiday. Crews removed these after the holiday and installed Bee City banners.

Crews performed 3 burials at Poplar Hill cemetery during this period.

Crews performed 145 utility locates this period for Ohio 811.

The monthly large item debris drop-off event will be this Saturday July 12<sup>th</sup> at the PW garage. This free service is available to residents on the second Saturday of each month from March through October, between 8am and 2pm.

Also, this Saturday July 12<sup>th</sup>, Scene 75 will be having a Touch-A-Truck event at their facility. Crews will be bringing some equipment to allow the public to get up close and explain some of the work PW does for the community.

#### Vehicle Maintenance:

The mechanics repaired a coolant hose on the Fire Division's Engine and wiring on utility truck #2. The mechanics also serviced Medic 1 and Medic 2.

The mechanics worked with Rodoc (formerly Midway Trailer Sales) to receive our new equipment tilt trailer.

Head Mechanic Skaggs has also been requesting and reviewing quotes for the 2026-2030 capital improvement budget items.

1. The installation of the new Mitel phone system will include approximately 250 phones, and the deployment process will take a few weeks to complete. We do not yet have a confirmed cutover date for the new phone system or a finalized schedule for user training. I expect to have more information available by next week and will share updates as they become available.

**INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY** 

- 2. Ohio HB 96 includes requirements for cities to formally adopt a cybersecurity plan. I will update our current cybersecurity and disaster recovery plan and get additional input from departments in September. After the plan is updated, I will submit the plan to City Council for approval.
- 3. I took pictures and video of several construction projects over the past few weeks. This includes the bikeway project, Ranchview Dr, Kenneth Ave, and the new public works parcel. I also filmed portions of Flight Fest and provided aerial surveillance during the event in coordination with the VFD.
- 4. The IT Department further expanded our offices in the basement of the Justice Center, taking over a small portion of the basement that was used by the Public Defender's Office. This gives IT additional space for storage and an office. I have moved my office from the "IT Common Area" to the newly acquired office across the hall.
- 5. Paul, Ben, and Thai continue to do a great job supporting the daily helpdesk tasks as well as working on new projects and hardening our security. Much of what they do behind the scenes often goes unnoticed, and they are constantly taking on new responsibility and learning new skills. We are fortunate to have such a great IT Team!



#### **CALLS FOR SERVICE**


The Division of Fire responded on  $\underline{372}$  calls for service in June ( $\underline{235}$  EMS calls and  $\underline{137}$  fire calls). An average of approximately twelve  $\underline{12}$  calls for service per day.



**Overlapping Call Volume:** A statistic that we can track now is how many of our calls for service overlapped (or occurred simultaneously) during this evaluation period. In June approximately **29%** of the call volume overlapped.

Crews responded to 372 calls for service in June, the chart below outlines call types:

The Major Incident Types in June were (%) of the total call volume/month):



- 1. Rescue & Emergency Medical Calls (61%) All the Division of Fire Emergency Medical calls including any motor vehicle/pedestrian accident (with/without injuries) and/or any technical rescue response.
- 2. Good Intent Calls (16%) Smoke scares, steam/fog mistaken for smoke, false alarms not malicious.
- 3. Customer Service Calls (8%) These are calls for service where fire crews are directly 6assisting a customer with a specific issue/problem (i.e., strange odors, smoke detector/CO detector installations and/or battery change outs, etc.).
- 4. Fire Alarm Calls (6%) This type of call includes malfunctioning fire alarms, intentional/unintentional false alarms, or calls where someone called to report an issue that turned out to not be an emergency (illegal burning, smells/sight of smoke or fire, or steam confused for smoke).
- 5. Hazardous Condition (3%) These are calls for service where fire crews are responding to natural gas/CO investigations, fuel/oil spills, and/or arching or downed electrical lines.
- 6. Fires (2%)- Fire loss reported **\$22,200** in June.
- 7. Severe Weather/Weather Related Response (2%)- wires down, arching wires, trees down, damage assessment, and/or road clearance.


#### **MUTUAL AID/JOINT RESPONSE DATA**










**Turnout Times EMS Calls For Service By Fire Stations** 




Turnout Times Fire Calls For Service By Fire Stations




**Overall Average Monthly Response Time** 




#### **CALLS FOR SERVICE BY DISTRICT**

#### TRANSPORTS BY MEDIC UNIT/MONTH




#### **Monthly Staffing Levels**

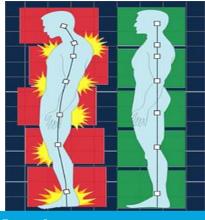

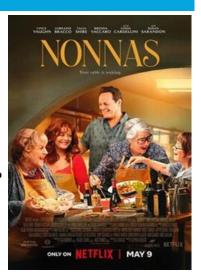

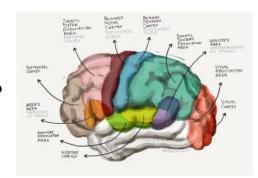

Tom Underwood from the Vandalia Public Library will be in the card room/library to answer your questions about your phone, tablet, and other devices. He will be here on August 7 and 21.

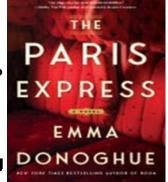
