- 4. Anything is possible.



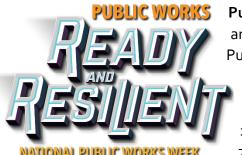

**Public Works Week!** It is public works week. As a team and community, we are thankful for the hard work of the Public Works Division.

Financial Update: Income tax revenue is strong – and currently up 8.55% (\$553,570) from 2021. As of April 30, 2022, the amount collected YTD was \$7,027,091, and is 7% higher than the estimated YTD amount based on the budget.

**National Police Week:** May 15<sup>th</sup> – May 21<sup>st</sup> is National Police Week 2022. As a community, we are recognizing the sacrifice of Police Officers who have made the ultimate sacrifice while serving their communities. In many cases, households are leaving blue lights on their porches at night.







Public Safety Professionals of the Year! Recently, the Vandalia Lions and Lioness clubs honored and recognized Jason Lawler, Firefighter of the year; Derek Copp, EMS Paramedic of the year; Officer Rich Sommer, Police Officer of the year; and Public Safety Specialist Haley Rue as PSS of the year! were nominated and selected by a panel of their peers for these awards in 2021.

Congratulations Dennis Edwards! Public Works Technician Dennis Edwards will be retiring from the City of Vandalia on May 31<sup>st</sup>. I am thankful for his 25 years of service. He told me that he plans to spend a lot of time fishing and with his family. Best of luck!

**Recruitment!** There are several open recruitments including full-time Police Officer and Public Works Technician. This week, we established an eligibility list for Public Safety

Specialist. Soon, we will be establishing eligibility lists or opening recruitments for Mechanic at Facility Maintenance, Firefighter/Paramedic/Inspector, City Planner, Zoning and Planning Administrator, and City Engineer. The City continues to have success recruiting applicants for the Part-Time Firefighter / Paramedic / EMT – I / EMT recruitment. There are several part-time vacancies as the City is



looking for summer help and has updated the part-time pay plan. Scan the QR code or visit VandaliaOhio.org/Jobs to view open recruitments.

**Collective Bargaining:** Last week, I reported that the union representing the Public Works employees filed a strike notice. I am pleased that our team of public servants instead decided to report to work. The City of Vandalia remains committed to reaching an agreement that is beneficial to both employees and taxpayers.

**Senior Center Attendance!** 721 people visited the Senior Center for various programs and activities between April 19 and May 2 for an average of 72.1 visits per operating day. The number of member daily visits continues to rise, and we are thankful for this enrichment.

Parks & Recreation Survey! The survey is hitting mailboxes and the consultant has reported more than 200 responses. The City must achieve about 375 responses to have a statistically valid sample of responses. Recipients of the survey will be given a one-day family pass to the Vandalia Recreation Center. There is some confusion regarding the instructions for redeeming this pass. I will send out a correction in the next week. The survey can be taken in paper form or online. Duplicate answers will be discarded as will any answers that are not validated from a matching address in the sample of randomly selected homes. In June and early July, we will be sending out an online survey for all users of our parks system.

**Facility Infrastructure:** The Facility Infrastructure Project roof work is underway at the Vandalia Recreation Center and Justice Center. Staging work will begin on the municipal center early next week.

**Knights Inn Shooting – Flock Security System:** Please see this update from Chief Althouse.

On Monday evening, May 2, officers responded to a shooting incident at the Knights Inn. Officers arrived to find one male victim with a minor injury to his shoulder. The other party involved was gone. The initial investigation revealed that after a road rage incident which began in Harrison Township, both parties ended up at the Knights Inn. According to the victim, he was attempting to leave the hotel parking lot when the suspect began shooting at his vehicle with a rifle. The victim returned fire with a handgun as he was trying to return to the hotel lot for cover. The victim did not know the suspect and was unable to obtain the suspect vehicle's license plate. Officers were able to identify a possible suspect vehicle using the newly installed Flock License Plate Reader system. The system recorded the license plate of a vehicle matching the description provided by the victim. Using this information, detectives were able to confirm the identity of the suspect and worked with the Adult Parole Authority to take him into custody. The suspect is currently incarcerated at the Montgomery County Jail on parole violation charges. VPD Detectives are still working on the investigation and criminal charges are pending for the shooting. Without the Flock system, it is likely we would not have identified or developed any suspect in this case.

**Webster Street Resurfacing:** Engineering for the Webster St. resurfacing project will begin this year and finish up in 2023. The project will be completed in 2024 at an estimated cost of \$979,414. Public Service Director Cron obtained a \$717,131 STP grant funding from MVRPC for this project. #nice

**Gabriel Street:** Sturm Construction continues to work on Gabriel Street. They have installed the new storm sewer and watermain. The new watermain has been installed and put into service. The old main will remain in service until all service connections are made. They are currently working on the sanitary sewer main installation and the service connection to the residents. Chad Baughman has been providing updates regarding access to this neighborhood for our emergency services departments.

**Asphalt Patching:** Asphalt patching has been a priority during this period. Crews have repaired several patches throughout the City using nearly 100 tons of asphalt including a large area on Dixie Drive near the library.

**Department / Division Updates:** Chief Follick and Chief Althouse have given great updates on their service areas at the last two study sessions. I have enclosed those presentations.

There will be a fall planting as well which we will be promoting to our residents, especially those who were in the direct path of the tornado.
- I, along with a number of staff members, attended the Culver's Ribbon Cutting on Monday May 2<sup>nd</sup>. This was a very nice event with a great turnout to welcome Culver's to

the community. They are wrapping up a few final details on landscaping now. The project should be complete very soon.

#### **Communication Update**

- Rich attended the Captains Meeting for the Corporate Challenge on Thursday. So far, we have had a good start to our recruiting efforts for the 2022 Vandalia Corporate Challenge. The Challenge runs from June 5 10. We have a few more planned employee pitches set to go to round out our team by opening day.
- Shred Day prep is well underway. Shred Day is Friday, May 20 from 9 a.m. to Noon. This past week we confirmed all of the details with our vendor and expect things to run very smoothly.
- We've had a good response thus far from people registering their garage sales for Garage sale Weekend. So far roughly 38 sales have been registered. **SUBJECT:** INFORMATION UPDATE – PERIOD ENDING MAY 6, 2022

1. On April 21<sup>st</sup>. Crews responded to a truck fire on National Rd. Due to a large diesel fuel spill as a result of this fire. The spill did make its way into the storm sewer system going into the Airport, so the Airport Fire and Dayton Regional HazMat were summoned to provide mutual aid assistance. The road was closed for a short time and cleaned up by our Public Works Dept. that afternoon.

- 2. The Division of Fire's new ladder truck build is definitely coming along. Our current update includes that the cab is on the full chassis and pump is in place. Next, will be the body and ladder device. The Division of Fire is getting excited as we are another step closer to completion.
- 3. The annual hydrant flushing scheduled to begin on May 2<sup>nd</sup>, has been postponed until the water tower maintenance at the Sports Complex can be completed. We still hope to be done in 2-3 weeks.
- 4. The Division of Fire continues to seek out part-time employees to fill multiple holes in our staffing schedule. The Division of Fire posted our new part-time pay scale and we hope to recruit additional part-time members. Additionally, we would like to attract those with experience to come "moonlight" with the Vandalia Division of Fire.
- 5. On April 30<sup>th</sup>, Brittany Trimbach with Coldwell Banker provided lunch to the crews. The crews are very appreciative for the thought and for the meal. Additionally, Ms. Trimbach plans to provide lunch to the on-duty crews each month for the remainder of the year.

- 6. I would like to thank you for allowing me to present the "State of the Division of Fire" update to City Council on May 2<sup>nd</sup>. Items in this presentation included but was not limited to staffing and deployment, calls for service statistics, turnout and response times and an update on our post-COVID community risk reduction efforts. I'm looking forward to revisiting several of the challenges that we have identified.
- 7. The Division of Fire is glad to have Jacob Walters sworn in as the newest full-time Firefighter/Paramedic member of the department. Jacob has been a part-time member of the Division of Fire since September 2020. He was sworn in and then pinned by fiancé Ryan Ross at the Monday May 2<sup>nd</sup> City Council Meeting. Welcome to the VFD family Jacob!
- 8. On May 3<sup>rd</sup>, The Division of Fire is pleased to update that an arrest had been made related to the M-Power gym fire. This fire has been mentioned in previous updates as an ongoing investigation. Christopher Herbst was taken into custody by US Marshal Southern Ohio Fugitive Strike Team (SOFAST). This was a successful joint effort between the Vandalia Division of Police and Vandalia Division of Fire. Mr. Herbst is currently in custody at Montgomery County Jail pending further court action.
- 9. Crews with the Division of Fire were able to attend the district wide pep rally for all the Vandalia Butler Schools on May 3<sup>rd</sup>. The Division of Fire is happy to support our kids and encourage them to finish strong as the end of the school year is near.
- 10. On May 3<sup>rd</sup>. The Vandalia Lions and Lioness clubs honored and recognized the Division of Fire's Firefighter and EMS Paramedic of the year. Jason Lawler, Firefighter of the year and Derek Copp, EMS Paramedic of the year were celebrated at their annual dinner. Congrats and thank you to these two for their dedicated service.

FINANCE – Administration Policy

3-9 Electronic Time Keeping

#### 3-9.0 Purpose:

This policy establishes a procedure for time keeping and the use of time clocks as it relates to recording and tracking hours worked by non-exempt personnel to ensure full compliance with the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) within departments where electronic time clocks are used. This policy shall apply to FLSA exempt employees where appropriate.

#### 3-9.1 Scope:

The City of Vandalia payroll function is centralized in the Finance Department under the administration of the Finance Director.

This policy applies to all non-exempt personnel working within a Division and/or Department equipped with a computerized time clock management system as designated by the Finance Director.

Exempt employees and other employees shall follow procedures established by the Department of Finance in collaboration with the Human Resources Manager for documenting of time worked within their respective department or division.

#### 3-9.2 Policy:

- A. Official Time: The electronic timekeeping system as designated by the Finance Director and associated records generated by or through the system shall serve as the official recording means of hours worked by employees. All other means of recording time will be replaced by the electronic time keeping system. The records within the electronic timekeeping system are the official records the City will use when calculating hours worked. Any disputes over information within the system shall be addressed immediately with the employee's supervisor (e.g., division manager, superintendent, department director).
- **B.** Corrections to Official Time: Corrections to Official Time may be necessary due to malfunction, unexpected change in work hours, etc. All changes to Official Time shall be documented and logged within the electronic timekeeping system and must be approved by the employee's department director or their supervisory designee.
- **C.** Rounding of Time: The City tracks work time in fifteen (15) minute increments using the 7/8 rounding rule in accordance with FLSA when calculating time. Rounding examples:
  - Clocking-in or clocking-out at 7:53 through 8:07 rounds to 8:00;
  - Clocking-in or clocking-out at 8:08 through 8:22 rounds to 8:15;
  - Clocking-in or clocking-out at 8:23 through 8:37 rounds to 8:30; and
  - Clocking-in or clocking-out at 8:38 through 8:52 rounds to 8:45.

**D.** Prohibition of employment of minors under the age of 14: Persons under the age of 14 are not eligible for employment at the City of Vandalia.

#### E. Restrictions on working hours for minors 14 and 15 years of age:

No person under the age of 16 shall be employed:

- 1. during school hours except where specifically permitted by Ohio Revised Code 4109;
- 2. before 7 a.m. or after 9:00 p.m. after June 1st to September 1st or during any school holiday of 5 school days or more; or after 7:00 p.m. at any other time;
- 3. for more than 3 hours a day in any school day;
- 4. for more than 18 hours in any school week;
- 5. for more than 8 hours in any day when school is not in session; and
- 6. for more than 40 hours in any week that school is not in session nor during school hours, unless employment is incidental to bona fide programs of vocational cooperative training, work-study, or other work-oriented programs with the purpose of educating students, and the program meets standards established by the state board of education.

#### F. Restrictions on working hours for minors 16 and 17 years of age:

No person age 16 or 17 who is required to attend school shall be employed:

- 1. before 7:00 a.m. on any day that school is in session or before 6:00 a.m. if the person was not employed after 8:00 p.m. the previous night; and
- 2. after 11:00 p.m. on any night preceding a day that school is in session.
- G. Daily Clock-in / Clock-out: All non-exempt employees working within a department / division using the electronic timekeeping system shall clock-in at the beginning of their scheduled workday and clock-out at the end of the workday. Under certain conditions (e.g., offsite training, beginning work at a different facility) the employee's supervisor (e.g., division manager, superintendent, department director) or designated administrative personnel may manually set the clock-in or clock-out time for the employee on that particular day [Note: This is meant to be a rare exception and not a normal occurrence.].

All non-exempt employees must clock-in at the beginning of their shift. Unless otherwise approved, employees may not clock-in more than seven (7) minutes before their shift begins.

Under applicable wage and hour laws, employees may not be docked for clocking in up to seven (7) minutes after the beginning of their shift; however, they may be deemed tardy and in violation of workplace rules and subject to discipline. Employees who clock-in after this seven (7) minute period shall be docked pay in fifteen (15) minute intervals and may be subject to discipline. All non-exempt employees must clock-out at the end of their shift. Employees are not permitted to clock-out more than seven (7) minutes past the end of their shift without prior approval. Clocking in more than seven (7) minutes before their regular workday begins or clocking out more than seven (7) minutes after their shift ends without prior approval may result in discipline.

#### H. Lunch and Other Breaks:

Regularly Scheduled Lunch and Other Breaks: Employees with a regularly scheduled lunch break do not have to clock-in / clock-out as the electronic timekeeping system will automatically deduct that

time depending on the employee's work schedule. From time to time, employees may be requested to work through their lunch to complete a project or task. Supervisors must approve working through lunch and the appropriate administrative staff person or supervisor must manually adjust the time within the system. Employees also do not need to clock-in / clock-out for short breaks unless specified by department or division policy.

Employees Without Regularly Scheduled Lunch or Other Breaks: Employees without a regularly scheduled lunch and / or other breaks shall be required to clock-in / clock-out for each occurrence.

Minor Employees: Employees who are under the age of 18 may not work more than five (5) consecutive hours without a rest period of at least 30 minutes. Employees who are under the age of 18 shall be required to clock-in and clock-out before and after the rest period.

- Falsification and / or Tampering: Any attempt by any employee to tamper with the timekeeping hardware or software will be considered a serious offense, subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment. Clocking-in or clocking-out for another employee (e.g., "buddy punching") will be considered a serious offense, with both employees being subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment. Anyone interfering with another employee's use of time clocks shall be subject to disciplinary action.
- J. Timeclock Fob Assignment: The electronic timekeeping system uses a built-in radio frequency identification system to identify the timeclock fob that is assigned to one specific employee. Employees are not permitted to use any timeclock fob other than the one assigned to them. Employees shall report a lost or missing timeclock fob to their supervisor. Employees shall be charged for the cost of replacement of a lost or missing timeclock fob in accordance with procedures established by the Director of Finance. Employees shall be required to return the assigned timeclock fob to their supervisor prior their final paycheck being processed. Failure to return the timeclock fob to the employee's supervisor will result in the employee being charged for the cost of replacing the timeclock fob from the employee's final paycheck.
- K. Conflicts: Departments / divisions may have more specific procedures for employees to follow as it relates to clocking-in and out. Supervisors are directed to verify changes to record keeping and clock-in / clock-out procedures with the Human Resources Manager prior to implementation. In the event a conflict arises between this policy and a recognized collective bargaining agreement, the procedures / rules agreed to within the agreement shall supersede this policy unless prohibited by law.

#### 3-9.3 Review & Questions:

Employees shall be provided an acknowledgement of receipt and understanding of Finance Administration Policy 3-9 on *Electronic Timekeeping*. Questions regarding this policy should be directed to the Payroll Specialist or Human Resources Manager. # D 1000 City Manager

#### **GOLF DIVISION**

April was not a great month for rounds of golf at Cassel Hills Golf Course. We experienced 20 days during the month that play was affected by weather, with 9 days totally washed out. May has not started out any better but we are anticipating better weather beginning next week.

All leagues, including two new leagues on Monday and Tuesday evenings, have started but most have experienced significant rainouts thus far in their season.

Superintendent Marty Szturm and his seasonal staff are working to keep up with mowing, even in wet areas. Due to wet grounds, there have been four incidents of mowers getting stuck in wet turf areas.

#### SENIOR CITIZENS CENTER

Senior Center Coordinator Toni Williams participated in a zoom meeting with Montgomery County Jobs and Family Services along with transportation coordinators from Kettering and Washington Township on April 28. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss a six month extension of the current senior transportation contract. The extension will take the contract through December, 2022.

Toni sent an email to Senior Center program and activity sponsors indicating we are expanding the monthly Senior Newsletter and have opportunities for advertising in the publication. A few hours after sending the email Toni received the first ad space purchase commitment from Medigold.

A total of 721 people visited the Senior Center for various programs and activities between April 19 and May 2 for an average of 72.1 visits per operating day. The number of member daily visits continues to rise.

#### **RECREATION CENTER**

Goat Yoga is scheduled for Saturday, May 7 at Helke Park, weather permitting. The event has reached its maximum number of 60 participants. Good Green Earth Farm is facilitating the program. Art Park Yoga will be held on Monday, May 9 at 4:30pm with Cathy Hackett instructing. The class will be held during the usual Yoga class time so in case of inclement weather, class will be held inside the VRC Fitness Studio..

Tai Chi with Premier Health is being offered on Tuesday and Thursday mornings in the VRC Fitness Studio. This class is free thanks to our partnership with Premier.

Fitness floor numbers for 2022, through April, have improved by 4,713 visits over the same time period in 2021. The month of April had a 1,226 increase in visits over April 2021. We continue to see good trending in all areas of visits and usage at the VRC as total attendance for April was 14,616 compared to 11,016 in April of 2021.

Alicia McCracken and Sharon Hamby attended the Vandalia-Butler Chamber of Commerce Women in Business Conference on April 26 at Scene 75. Both reported that it was very beneficial to them personally and professionally to attend the event.

Our Annual Rose for Mom Essay Contest was once again a hit with local students. The 15 winning essays were celebrated on May 3 at the Butler High School Banquet room. Winning essays read their letters to the group and presented their Mom with a rose.

Earth Day Terrariums, a youth program, was held at the VRC on April 19. Eight participants learned about terrariums and made their own to take home as part of the class.

The VRC staff has implemented an Appreciation Station feature for members and guests to write an appreciation note on a sticky note and place it on the board. It is a great way for patrons to be able to communicate their appreciation for a class, instructor, VRC staff or whatever they may appreciate about the facility. (See attached picture)

#### RECREATION/ATHLETICS DIVISION

Preparations are underway for the opening of Cassel Hills Swimming Pool. A training session for SwimSafe Front Desk staff and Pool Managers will be held on May 17 with topics covering Rec Trac and money handling. SwimSafe personnel have been onsite preparing the pool for the May 28 opening and have replaced the outdated Virginia Graham Baker main drain covers in the deep well.

The 2022 Vandalia Corporate Challenge Captains Meeting will be held on May 5 at the VRC. We have 11 business teams registered to play in this year's event, which will be held June 5-10.

Adult Softball Leagues started play this week at Helke Park. We have 10 Men's Monday Night teams and 7 CoEd Friday Night teams participating at Helke Park this summer.

Opening day for our Youth Baseball/Softball program was held on April 23 at the Sports Complex. The day went very well with team pictures and games kicking off the summer season. Kona Ice did an outstanding job operating the concession stand and will only get better with time.

#### **FACILITY MAINTENANCE DIVISION**

The Annual Arbor Day Celebration, held at Helke Park on April 29, was once again very successful. We are very thankful for Mayor Richard Herbst taking the time to not only attend the event, but also speak to over 300 Helke Elementary students in attendance about the importance of trees in our community. Thank you also goes to Council Member Follick for attending and supporting the event again this year. Helke students assisted with the planting of a Sugar Hackberry tree and also received a bare root White Flowering Dogwood tree to take home and plant.

Facility Infrastructure Project roof work is underway at the VRC. The flat roof of the pool, gymnasium and west side are all in stages of replacement. Gutter replacement over the track windows and metal flashing on the brick/metal transition on the center wall is underway as well. Staff met with ESG to discuss the Justice Center roof replacement portion of the project. A storage box and trash dumpster have been staged on the west side of the Municipal Building in preparation for the lighting replacement work.

Plumbing work at various locations is being completed including a toilet replacement in the south soccer restroom building and a spigot replacement at the golf course maintenance building.

Rudy and I met with Vancon representatives to begin the design and cost estimating for a restroom facility at Robinette Park. We plan to submit this project for an ODNR NatureWorks grant as a partner project with Montgomery County Board of Developmental Disabilities Services.

Maintenance staff is planting commemorative trees this spring at various parks and facilities. Spruce trees will be planted first and then other species to finish the project this spring. More commemorative trees will be planted in the fall.

Facility Maintainer Andrew Christian and Administrative Assistant Debbie Doench attended the Arbor Day Foundation Tree City USA Awards Program hosted by the City of Springdale on April 22. The City of Vandalia received recognition for being a Tree City USA community for 8 years. Both Andrew and Debbie won a tree as part of the program. - 1. During the past two (2) weeks, VPD officers made 21 traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations. These stops resulted in one (1) traffic citation, 19 written warnings and one (1) verbal warning while working 16 additional enforcement hours.
- 2. CPO Wehner visited Vandalia-Butler Pre-School at First Light Church on May 11<sup>th</sup> during the morning and afternoon sessions. Officer Wehner covered several summer safety topics and afterwards each student was able to sit in a police cruiser and check out the equipment with the assistance of Officer Minnix. There were approximately 120 students present between both sessions.
- 3. Detective Krimm and CPO Wehner held an Explorer meeting on May 10<sup>th</sup> to cover firearm safety and operation. The Explorers were permitted to view and handle various weapons as they learned about them. This is in preparation for allowing the Explorers to participate in controlled shooting drills at the range. The Explorers are excited about this opportunity and we hope it draws more attention to the program.
- 4. CPO Wehner attended Morton Middle School on May 13<sup>th</sup> for career day. He spoke to four different groups about a career in law enforcement and his experiences that brought him to VPD. The police officer profession had one of the biggest draws of students for the present career professionals. Officer Wehner also used this as a great recruiting opportunity for the Explorer program.
- 5. CPO Wehner represented VPD during Spring Fling at Demmitt Elementary on Friday evening, May 13<sup>th</sup>. There was a large turnout of students and parents throughout the district. Everyone was able to check out the Crime Prevention Services' cruiser, get stickers, and have their picture taken. We look forward to attending this event next year.
- 6. Explorer Gavin Rieger and CPO Wehner attended Party in the Park at Helke Park on Saturday, May 14<sup>th</sup>. They took one of the new cruisers to display for this event and for the public to view the significant changes to VPD's cruiser style and design. The interest in the cruiser was almost non-stop with some children waiting in line to sit inside the cruiser and see all the equipment placed in the patrol vehicle. The public had a very positive response for the new design and look.
- 7. CPO Wehner and VBSD held the Third Grade Safety Patrol party for the students from Demmitt and Helke Elementary Schools today, May 20. All the students who

participated in the program throughout the year were treated to free pizza and skating at Skateworld. Two lucky students from each school were selected to win a brand-new bicycle. The party and bicycles are made possible through donations from businesses throughout the City and we thank them for their continued support.

- 8. Lieutenant Sucher and I attended the annual Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police Conference in Columbus May 8-10. This year's keynote speaker was Gordon Graham, a nationally renowned risk management expert. Other seminars offered covered employment law matters in law enforcement, developments in collective bargaining, organizing resources for handling protests and riots, dealing with the "Arsonist in the Office" by *Fireproofing Your Agency*, Cleveland First a presentation on missing persons revolving around the Cleveland abductions, and how to respond to and navigate during the loss of an officer in the line of duty.
- 9. On May 11, Lieutenant Sucher and I attended a presentation with FD and City representatives on a public safety training facility as part of the Request for Qualifications (RFQ).
- 10. On May 12, Lieutenant Sucher, you and I had second round interviews on two applicants for the public safety specialist position. Both candidates passed this interview and we begin processing the top candidate for the PSS opening.
- 11. On May 16, I attended the Crisis Intervention Training (CIT) Steering Committee virtual meeting hosted by ADAMHS. The CIT Academy hosted by ADAMHS continues to have strong attendance and provide outstanding training for police officers from across Montgomery County on de-escalation skills and interactions with individuals suffering mental health crisis or illness. VPD's goal is to have all patrol officers and sergeants trained in CIT by year's end.
- 12. I appreciate the opportunity to make a presentation to City Council and those attending last Monday night's Study Session. There are many exciting projects and activities that are in the process or being planned for the near future which allows the men and women of VPD to serve and provide top-quality service to our residents. I trust the information I shared enlightened Council and staff to the most recent achievements and developments at VPD.
- 13. On May 18, I attended the Clark State Community College's Criminal Justice Advisory Board virtual meeting. This meeting provided the latest information on developments in the Criminal Justice college program and Clark State's Police Academy. Additionally, Clark State Community College was selected by the Ohio Peace Officers' Training Academy to be a host site for courses that qualify for the Continuing Professional Training (CPT) classes. The college will be hosting a *Public Safety Day* open house on May 21 from 9am to noon.
- 14. I attended a virtual meeting for the Montgomery County Drug Free Coalition on Thursday, hosted by the Sheriff's Office. There was discussion on hosting a targeted enforcement blitz at a future date with a collaboration of police agencies.
- 15. Lieutenant Walker and I attended the annual Vandalia-Butler High School Memorial Program on Friday at the Student Activity Center. This memorable program is a very special tribute to the men and women from our community who served in the military and some who paid the ultimate price to protect our freedoms. The high school students and staff always do an outstanding job remembering and honoring our true heroes in the military.

- 16. This past week was Police Memorial Week in honor of all our fallen officers and those who currently serve. In memory of our fallen officers, we parked a VPD patrol vehicle with a wreath at the corner of National Road and James Bohanan Memorial Drive. We wish to thank the many businesses and individuals who either stopped by or delivered special cards and/or food items to VPD during police week.
- 17. Detectives charged a 46-year-old Vandalia man with one count of Menacing after he made threats to cause physical harm to another Vandalia resident and his truck.

- 1. During the past two (2) weeks, VPD officers made 22 traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations. These stops resulted in three (3) traffic citations, 16 written warnings, one (1) verbal warning and two (2) parking citations while working 16 additional enforcement hours.
- 2. On April 19, Lieutenant Sucher and Officer Wehner attended a virtual webinar related to commercial vehicle operators and prosecution of certain traffic offenses. This training is part of our efforts to enhance commercial vehicle enforcement.
- 3. Detectives charged a 29-year-old Riverside man with one count of burglary. The charge originated after officers obtained DNA evidence from the scene that identified the suspect in a residential burglary from September 2021.
- 4. Detectives charged a 51-year old Dayton man with animal abandonment and having an unlicensed dog. The male was observed on video abandoning his dog at the Animal Resource Center.
- 5. Detectives charged a 28-year old Dayton woman with grand theft for stealing a refrigerator and stove from a Vandalia apartment when she moved out of the rental.
- 6. Patrol officers arrested a 54-year-old Vandalia man for making threats to a subject via a third party. Detectives charged this male with one count of felony Violation of a Protection Order and a misdemeanor probation violation.
- 7. Property room custodians completed the spring purge. 309 items were either destroyed, donated, or auctioned. In conjunction with the purge, the DEA picked up over 82 pounds of prescription drugs taken in through the drug drop-off receptacle in the police lobby.
- 8. Detectives charged a 42-year old Dayton man with felonious assault. The male punched his girlfriend in the face causing serious fractures while in the Arby's parking lot.
- 9. On April 27, Officer Large was dispatched to an unresponsive male in a vehicle on Northwoods Boulevard near the Interstate 75 overpass. Officer Large attempted to remove the male from the vehicle to perform life-saving measures and the vehicle began to roll down an embankment. Officer Large was evaluated at an area

- hospital for minor injuries and was released. The male was transported to a local hospital to be treated for a drug overdose.
- 10. Lieutenant Walker and Support Services Manager Anissa Kanzari attended the Motorola Summit conference April 26 through April 28 in Florida. Motorola is the parent company to Spillman, which provides our agency software for computer-aided dispatch (CAD), records management system (RMS), property/evidence management, and mobile reporting. The conference provides cost-effective training in the different applications of Spillman's software systems, as well as the opportunity to view demonstrations of new technology. One of the most beneficial parts of this conference is the ability to interact face-to-face with our customer service team from Motorola. This provides us the ability to work through any problems we are experiencing and provide suggestions for improvements.
- 11. Crime Prevention Officer Wehner attended the annual Ohio Crime Prevention Conference April 24-27, which included several sessions on new crime prevention techniques as well as networking with other officers from around the State. Officer Wehner was able to bring back what he learned and implement fresh ideas that benefit the safety and security of our community.
- 12. We celebrated our administrative professionals on April 27. The Montgomery County Police Chiefs' Association held a luncheon at Sinclair Community College to recognize our administrative professionals and thank them for the vital roles they play in our success.
- 13. Patrol officers completed Phase I of range training on April 28 & 29. This portion of training included successfully qualifying with on-duty, off-duty, and back-up firearms and intermediate weapons. Officers also tested and evaluated several handgun options in anticipation of replacement of Division-issued firearms in 2023. Officers will be completing electronic surveys to provide their feedback on the various handgun options.
- 14. VPD hosted the final of three continuing professional training (CPT) classes titled Legally Confident Tactically Confident. Twenty-six officers from various agencies attended the final training day on May 2. All VPD officers have completed half of the mandatory 24 hours of CPT for 2022. The remaining CPT hours will be scheduled over the upcoming months.
- 15. The Vandalia Lions Club held an awards dinner at the Senior Citizens Center on May 3 to honor public safety employees from Vandalia and Butler Township. Officer Rich Sommer and PSS Haley Rue were nominated and selected by a panel of their peers for these awards in 2021. Lieutenant Walker presented them with a framed certificate from the Lions Club during the event.



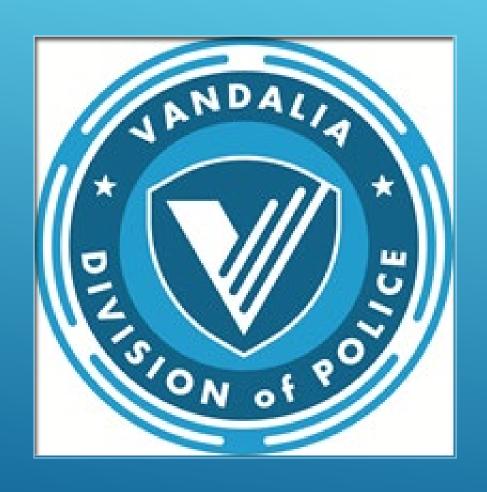






- 16. Lieutenant Walker and Lieutenant Sucher attended a meeting on Wednesday with Air Show staff regarding parking changes and logistics for the 2022 event. This year's Air Show is scheduled for July 30-31.
- 17. Primerica Financial Services returned on Thursday, May 5, to hold their second employee financial wellness workshop. The presentation focused on how to make your money work for you and how to secure your financial future. The workshop was presented during each roll call throughout the day to include the employees who were unable to attend the first workshop held in April. Employee financial wellness is one of the ways we are expanding our employee wellness program.
- 18. Lieutenant Walker and I attended the annual breakfast and prayer service on May 5 held at First Light Baptist Church in recognition of the 2022 National Day of Prayer.
- 19. The VPD Honor Guard attended the Ohio Peace Officers' Memorial Ceremony on May 5. This ceremony is held at the Ohio Peace Officers' Training Academy where the Ohio Fallen Officers Memorial Wall is located in London, Ohio. Names of all Ohio officers killed in the line of duty are etched in the wall. The ceremony honors the sacrifice these officers made in service to their communities. On May 6, Division employees participated in the Montgomery County Law Enforcement Memorial Ceremony in Dayton at the Riverscape Pavilion. VPD Honor Guard members escorted family members of Lieutenant James Bohanan as they pinned a carnation on the FOP star during the ceremony in remembrance of his sacrifice. Lieutenant Bohanan was killed in the line-of-duty on December 31, 1969, during a search warrant execution on counterfeiters at a local hotel.
- 20. National Police Week is the week of May 15-21. In honor and remembrance of all fallen officers, VPD will stage a patrol vehicle and wreath at National Road and James Bohanan Boulevard. This week is also *Light Ohio Blue* week where businesses and residents are encouraged to install a blue light at their house or illuminate their property with blue lights to pay honor for all police officers who serve or have paid the ultimate sacrifice by giving their life while serving their communities.
- 21. Detective charged a 50-year old Vandalia man with felony domestic violence for assaulting his 16-year old nephew who lives with him.

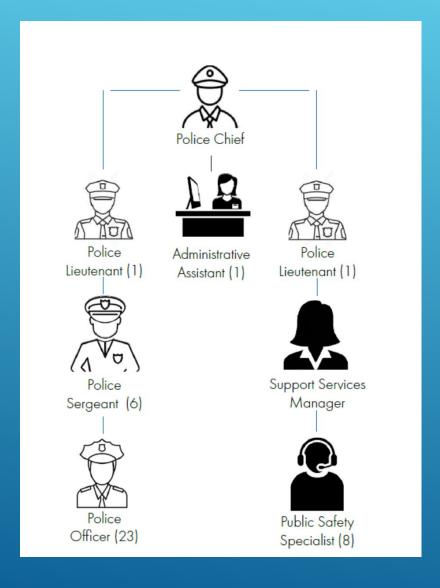
- 22. On Monday evening, May 2, officers responded to a shooting incident at the Knights Inn. Officers arrived to find one male victim with a minor injury to his shoulder. The other party involved was gone. The initial investigation revealed that after a road rage incident which began in Harrison Township, both parties ended up at the Knights Inn. According to the victim, he was attempting to leave the hotel parking lot when the suspect began shooting at his vehicle with a rifle. The victim returned fire with a handoun as he was trying to return to the hotel lot for cover. The victim did not know the suspect and was unable to obtain the suspect vehicle's license plate. Officers were able to identify a possible suspect vehicle using the newly installed Flock License Plate Reader system. The system recorded the license plate of a vehicle matching the description provided by the victim. Using this information, detectives were able to confirm the identity of the suspect and worked with the Adult Parole Authority to take him into custody. The suspect is currently incarcerated at the Montgomery County Jail on parole violation charges. VPD Detectives are still working on the investigation and criminal charges are pending for the shooting. Without the Flock system, it is likely we would not have identified or developed any suspect in this case.
- 23. On Wednesday morning, May 4, Huber Heights Police were involved in a vehicle pursuit of an armed robbery suspect. The pursuit went westbound on I-70, northbound on the Airport Access Road and exited to travel eastbound on National Road. The pursuit continued through town as the suspect vehicle went south on Dixie Drive from National Road. Huber Heights Police requested VPD to setup Stop Sticks if possible to help end the pursuit. A VPD officer was able to setup Stop Sticks on Dixie Drive at Mulberry Road; however, the attempt to deploy them was unsuccessful. The pursuit continued into Harrison Township before the suspect crashed the vehicle on Needmore Road at I-75 and was taken into custody. No Vandalia officers were involved in the pursuit.

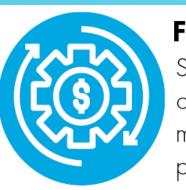

#### **Development & Engineering Services**

Sturm Construction continues to work on Gabriel Street. They have installed the new storm sewer and water main. The watermain has been hydro tested and samples have been sent to Pace Labs. Once we receive the results, the new main will be put into service and they can start making taps for new services to residents. The contractor was planning to start the sanitary sewer main replacement from Vista to Brocone this week, but the rainy weather has kept them away. The wet weather also causes more infiltration into the line which makes bypass pumping a challenge. Hopefully, next week the weather will be more cooperative.

The weather has also delayed the start of our concrete contractor. They have completed almost all of the saw cutting but the weather had delayed their crews on another project they are completing before they come to Vandalia.

Our Dog Leg Road Utility Expansion project has been advertised and is out for bid. Bids are due and will be opened on May 25<sup>th</sup>.

Amber, You and I met with Choice One Engineering to discuss the engineering for Phase Two of the west utility extensions. They will be providing us a proposal to perform the engineering and prepare construction drawings for this phase. Phase Two would extend water and sanitary sewer to our western corporation limits.

I met with Blake Simpson from ODOT to review the Scope of Services for the Webster Street Resurfacing project. Once the scope is set we can begin the selection of a firm to perform the engineering. Engineering will begin this year and finish up in 2023. The project will be sold by ODOT in the first half of 2024. The total project cost with engineering is estimated at \$979,414.00 and we will be receiving up to \$717,131.00 in STP funding from MVRPC.

We have heard from a couple residents that were affected on the Adeline Drainage project that was completed in early 2021 about the restoration in their rear yards. Chad Baughman has made contact with our contractor to set up a time to meet and discuss what they can do to satisfy the residents.

Chad has also contacted Coate Construction about touching up some of the yard restoration from the handicap ramps that were installed last winter. He has also contacted Brumbaugh Construction about re-working some of the yard restoration on Helke Road from that project as well.

The developer has cleared the site at 710 Deer Run Drive for their proposed facility. They have submitted site plans, storm water, and building drawings for review. We have returned comments and they are currently making revisions to their plans.

A Certificate of Occupancy was issued for an existing Banquet Center at 3119 Stop Eight Road.

Building review for the project at 710 Deer Run Rd. is completed and a footer and foundation permit can be issued once the site plan review is complete and a replat is done to remove the utility easements where Top Notch Ct. previously was. Pete Baldauf and I met with the site contractor this week to discuss the next steps, their schedule, and our requirements for abandoning the existing utilities on site.

DES staff and the Fire Department have also been reviewing site and utility plans for the proposed development at the end of Capstone Way. Meetings have been positive as we continue to work through the challenges of providing our top tier services to a development and building this size.

Chad Baughman provided information to the Census Bureau for their Boundary and Annexation Survey (BAS). We had one minor boundary change with transfer of property at the old Fire Station site to the City of Dayton.

Chad and I met with Darren Davey to discuss the layout of the proposed parking area for the IT Dept. at the Justice Center. We will layout the project for our concrete contractor to perform the curb work.

We welcomed Robert Martin as our new Electrical Inspector in DES on May 3<sup>rd</sup>. Robert comes with many years of experience from the Montgomery County Inspection Division.

#### **Public Works**

Asphalt patching has been a priority during this period. Crews have repaired several patches throughout the City using 40+ tons of asphalt including the large patch on S. Dixie Drive from a watermain break last winter. We also continue to monitor pot holes and patch as needed.

Several technicians attended a session on Mueller Fire Hydrant training. This training helps allow us to repair and maintain our hydrants in house.

We performed two burials at Poplar Hill Cemetery during this period. We have also begun preparation for pouring of monument foundations at Poplar Hill. Our goal is to have all outstanding foundations poured so that monuments can be set by Memorial Day.

Crews replaced another one of our solar lights in the median on N. Dixie Drive that was struck by a hit and run driver.

We drained the Sports Complex Water Tower for our contractor to perform the required inspection and cleaning as part of our water tower maintenance contract. We are currently refilling the tower and have sent samples to Pace Labs for testing of the water before being put back in to service.

Public Works employees were issued the new key fabs for the Executime time management system. Employees will begin using the key fabs for clocking in and out this week.

Our crews picked up and delivered the scissor lift to assist in the painting of the Mural on National Road.

Wally Ritchie and I attended the NAWA Technical Committee meeting on May 4th.

Wally met with Starr Markworth of MVRMA to discuss different training opportunities and setting up a program to coordinate.

We have advertised for the recruitment of seasonal employees to assist in our busy times during the summer.

We will also be advertising very soon for full time Public Works Technicians. We currently have three full time vacancies and are also missing another who is currently on military deployment.

One of the vacancies was created by the recent retirement of Mark Blosser. Mark's last day was April 29<sup>th</sup>. We all congratulate Mark on his retirement and thank him for his 26 years of dedicated service to the City of Vandalia.

#### **Development & Engineering Services**

Sturm Construction continues to work on Gabriel Street. They have installed the new storm sewer and watermain. The new watermain has been installed and put into service. The old main will remain in service until all service connections are made. They are currently working on the sanitary sewer main installation and the service connection to the residents. Chad Baughman has been providing updates regarding access to this neighborhood for our emergency services departments.

DL Smith Concrete has begun the removing and replacing concrete curbs and sidewalks in preparation for this year's street resurfacing program. They have already completed a few streets including Corporate Center Drive and Koch Avenue. They are currently working in the Woodland Meadows and Foxboro Manor subdivisions.

We will open bids for the Dog Leg Road Utility Expansion project next Wednesday May 25<sup>th</sup>. Currently ten contractors have picked up bid packages. We continue to reach out to the property owners in attempt to obtain the required easements for this project.

We have a signed agreement in place for the Engineering and Design for the Airport Access Road NB Bridge Deck Rehabilitation. We have given LJB the notice to proceed with their work. We plan to submit this project to the Ohio Public Works Commission for possible funding in 2023.

We have also issued a notice to proceed with Choice One Engineering for the engineering and design of a new traffic signal at the intersection of Northwoods Boulevard and the I-75 SB ramps.

I have met with ODOT and we have completed our LPA Agreement and Scope of Services for the Webster Street Resurfacing project that we have been awarded funding through MVRPC. I am in the process of preparing a Request for Proposals for the engineering work for this project. We will have a recommendation for this work on an upcoming Council Agenda.

The contractor has begun site work at 710 Deer Run Drive for their proposed facility. They have submitted site plans, storm water, and building drawings for review. Building plans have been submitted and reviewed. They will need to abandon the existing utilities on the vacated Top Notch Ct. and prepare a record plan vacating the easements before issuing the permit to begin construction of the actual building.

Drawings have also been submitted for the proposed development at the end of Capstone Way. Building and site plans are currently under review.

We are very close to issuing the permit for Phase One of the Redwood Development buildings. Plans have been reviewed and approved and the permit can be issued once we receive confirmation that the record plan is recorded at Montgomery County.

I attended the MVRPC Technical Advisory Committee Meeting on May 19th.

#### **Public Works**

Asphalt patching has been a priority during this period. Crews have repaired several patches throughout the City using nearly 100 tons of asphalt including a large area on Dixie Drive near the library. We had to grind out a large area of concrete under this section of roadway.

We also continue to patch pot holes as we see them or if reported

We performed two burials at Poplar Hill Cemetery during this period. We also poured 14 monument foundations and set two military markers at Poplar Hill as well.

We performed water shut offs for delinquent customers during this period. There were 38 customers on the list this month.

The Sports Complex Water Tower was put back in to service once we received negative bacteria samples after refilling the tower. After this tower was put back in to service we drained the Inverness Tower for its cleaning. We are refilling this tower now and will be taking samples and plan to have it back in service next week. Our crews picked up and delivered the scissor lift to assist in the painting of the Mural on National Road.

With all of the different construction activity and development in the City we have performed 111 utility locates to date this month. This can be a very time consuming but critical service we provide to protect our utilities during excavations.

Wally Ritchie and I attended the Tri Cities Wastewater Authority Technical Committee meeting on May 11th.

We also received notification that Dennis Edwards will be retiring from the City of Vandalia effective May 31<sup>st</sup>. We would like to thank Dennis for his 25 years of service to the City of Vandalia and wish him the best of luck in his retirement.

The City organization retains a strong bond rating of Aa2, annual all funds budget of approximately \$57 million, and an average full-time workforce of 234 full-time equivalent employees. Under the direction of the City Manager, the leadership team executes the policy directives of the Vandalia City Council including the day-to-day operations of police, fire, emergency medical services, and dispatch; water distribution, wastewater collection, and storm water utilities; public works and street construction; economic development, building and zoning, planning, and engineering services; and community enrichment through the Vandalia Recreation Center, Senior Center, Cassel Hills Golf Course, and numerous parks.

# **PUBLIC SERVICE DEPARTMENT**

The Department of Public Service is staffed by dedicated and highly trained public servants who provide residents with efficient, honest, and courteous service through the divisions of Public Works and Development and Engineering Services. The department is led by our tenured Director of Public Service, Rob Cron.



# PUBLIC WORKS DIVISION

The Public Works Division is responsible for general maintenance of 210 lane miles of roadways; leaf collection; fleet management and the City garage; maintenance, repair and replacement of water mains, sanitary and storm sewers; operation of Poplar Hill Cemetery; ice and snow removal; street sweeping; roadway painting; and sign and signal maintenance. The Public Works team is highly visible to our residents, businesses, and visitors. The City prides itself on ensuring a high level of customer service at every touchpoint with the public.

Full-time employees within the Public Works Division are represented by the Teamsters Local Union No. 957. The Employer and the Union entered into an initial <u>collective bargaining agreement</u> on April 20, 2020. The current collective bargaining agreement expired on December 31, 2021 and is currently under negotiation.

The City of Vandalia is seeking several skilled technicians to join its Public Works team. Vandalia Public Works Technicians perform a variety of duties, as follows:

- Construction, maintenance and repair of streets, curbs and sidewalks, catch basins, manholes, water, sewer, street and storm drainage.
- Operation and maintenance of trucks and power construction and maintenance equipment inspecting, maintaining, loading, and hauling and unloading trash, leaves, gravel, salt, asphalt and concrete.
- Mowing, trimming, plowing snow.
- Miscellaneous tasks: guardrail installation and repair, opening and closing of graves, pick-up and
  disposal of dead animals, collection of large trash, painting and installation of traffic control markings and
  devices, and all other duties as assigned.

Must obtain satisfactory scores on all phases of the qualification process, including oral interviews, practical assessments, background check, physical exam and drug screen.

Understanding generation prices:

- AES Ohio, along with other utilities in the state, participate in a market-based auction for generated electricity annually.
- The auction is conducted by an independent third-party with oversight by the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio (PUCO). The auction results are not within the control of AES Ohio. The auction outcomes are based on many factors including increased inflation and the rising price of natural gas. The pricing is based on market conditions on the day of the auction.
- The new generation rates will go into effect June 1, 2022 for one year.
- Customers who received their electric generation from AES Ohio (known as standard service offer or SSO) will see their generation rates increased by \$0.061 per kWh, from \$0.048 to \$0.109. Example: The current bill for a typical 1,000 kWh SSO customer is \$97.66, the new proposed bill will be \$158.61.
- In Ohio, customers can buy their electric generation from any PUCO-certified supplier.
- The market-based auction for generation is separate from the AES Ohio's investment and rates for transmission and distribution cases that are subject to PUCO approval.
