

- 1. Employee Appreciation: The Employee Ice Cream Social will be held on Wednesday, June 16, at the Vandalia Sports Complex from 1:00 2:30 pm. I have been practicing my scooping technique. Non-uniformed staff are permitted to wear jeans, shorts of appropriate length and style, and polo t-shirts (or a comfortable equivalent) to work on Wednesday. The purpose of this event is to appreciate our team of public servants and for our senior staff to feed them with no other expectations. Please plan to attend and join our celebration if you are available. The dates of future events are enclosed as an attachment.
- 2. Thoughts on Teamwork: Chief Althouse sent me a memorandum detailing the outstanding teamwork that the Vandalia community achieved to return a lost boy to his family last week. I have enclosed the memorandum as an attachment. To those involved thank you for your outstanding contributions to promoting strong public safety outcomes. You inspire us and bring pride to Vandalia.

Dewberry, Mr. Dwight Dewberry, Public Service Director Rob Cron, and Support Services Manager Anissa Kanzari brought glory and pride to the City of Vandalia this week with their merciless and epic domination of all competitors in the *Closest to the Pin* event at Corporate Challenge. This is the first time that the City has won an event since 2018. #halloffame

Nine teams have participated this year including: Inteva Products, GE Aviation, GE Aviation TDI, Crossroads Rehab and Nursing Facility, Johnson Electric, Vandalia-Butler Schools, Waible Energy, Kentner Sellers CPAs, and the City of Vandalia. Moving past COVID-19, this Corporate Challenge has been marked by teamwork, *esprit de corps*, and mutual appreciation for some healthy competition.

- 4. Street Resurfacing: At the upcoming meeting of City Council, I will recommend and ask approval to award \$582,932.32 to Barrett Paving Materials, Inc. for the annual street resurfacing program. The project is under the engineer's estimate and within the 2021 budget as passed by City Council. Funds will be allocated from the Safe and Stable Levy and Street Fund. I have enclosed a map of the streets that will be paved this year including: N. Dixie Drive (National – north of Inverness), Falls Creek Drive (Northwoods – north of Crossroads), Poe Avenue (Little York – Homestretch), Old Springfield Road (175 – Old Springfield Court), Old Springfield Court, Fitchland Drive, Stewville Drive, Continental Court, Waldsmith Way (S. Brown School - west of Palomino), Claycrest Road, Palomino Avenue, Hunters Chase Drive, Deer Creek Drive, and Cole Court. The City is first in line to receive unspent Ohio Public Works Commission funds for the \$781,666 Gabriel Street Reconstruction Project. This project includes full-depth repairs to the roadway and new utilities. To date, there have been nine water main breaks and at least six sanitary issues reported on the Gabriel Street. If awarded, this previously budgeted project would include a 50% low-interest loan and 50% grant. Also, on June 21, 2021, I will recommend that Council appropriate funds for the full-depth reconstruction of Helke Rd. and water line migration from National Rd. to just short of Adeline Ave. Helke Rd. has experienced rapid degradation due to 16 water main breaks and subsurface failure because the current materials predate and are not compliant with modern construction standards. The engineer's estimate was \$800,000. I am pleased to report that the City received several bids below this estimate. A map of the Helke Rd. project area is enclosed.
- 5. Health Insurance Open Enrollment: This year the City will administer open enrollment via an online portal from November 1 November 15. This technology will eliminate redundant data entry and save time while providing employees with the opportunity to enroll remotely via phone or computer. HR Manager Dewberry, helpful staff, and computer stations will be available at preset times during the enrollment period for employees who would like assistance.
- 6. Airshow: The Air Show is just one month away! I have included a report from CenterPoint Energy Dayton Air Show Executive Director Terry Grevious. This report includes the scheduled program and list of the 43 aircraft that will likely be on static display at the show. I have conducted a cursory review of the invitation list for the City's chalet. Invitations are being printed. I will be inviting several developers and builders in an effort to recruit and to deliver on the beautiful future that is outlined in our comprehensive plan.
- 7. General Upkeep: Vandalia is great city with caring residents. We have a duty to maintain our facilities and public spaces in a manner that is in-line with our status as a top-tier suburb. In the coming weeks, you will see faded and non-compliant signs be replaced, overgrowth being trimmed back, and graffiti being remedied in our parks. We seek to be purposefully picturesque so if you see something say something. Maintenance and improvement of existing facilities continues to be a challenge due to prior workforce reductions. I will work with staff to analyze staffing requirements against expected



service levels in all departments.

8. Commercial Truck Traffic: This week our team met with our lobbyists to discuss options for advancing the City's position with regard to growing commercial truck traffic and public safety issues. To continue to grow relationships and seek collaborative opportunities, I met face-to-face with City Manager Applegate of Union, City of Dayton Director of Aviation Gil Turner, and Executive Director Steve Stanley of the Montgomery County Transportation Improvement District. Each of the meetings was pleasant, productive, and the parties left understand the other's position with regard to commercial development and resulting truck traffic. There are a lot of creative ideas flowing among staff at all levels and our external peers. All I can say is that there are opportunities everywhere.

Recently, the U.S. Senate Environment and Public Works Committee approved the Surface Transportation Reauthorization Act of 2021. Mr. Brad Roseberry, Vice President of the Coalition Against Bigger Trucks, has reported to Chief Althouse that the act does not include an increase in the national truck size or weight limits. The City will continue to monitor such considerations in future legislative actions as an increase in weight and size could lead to unanticipated expenses with regard to required infrastructure improvements, quicker degradation of roadways, and safety concerns.

With regard to enforcement, during the past two weeks, VPD officers made 45 traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations. These stops resulted in 5 traffic citations, 38 written warnings and 2 verbal warnings while working 48 additional enforcement hours.

- 9. Mural Grant Project: ACM Holloway will present the City's mural project to the Culture Works special projects grant application committee on June 25, 2021. I am pleased that the City has advanced to the next step of the application process. The Vision Vandalia Comprehensive Plan calls for the creation of public art to continue building sense of place in the community. If awarded, the project would incorporate the services of a local artist and community members will have an opportunity to participate in a community painting day!
- 10. B&J's Shaved Ice Now Available at Sports Complex Concession Stand: Ben and Julie Neely are selling shaved ice in the concession stand during the 2021 youth baseball, softball, and soccer seasons. The City is being compensated through a \$600 payment to the youth team sport scholarship and a \$500 donation to the Youth Recreation Fund through the Dayton Foundation.
- **11. Drug Free Coalition:** Earlier this month, the Vandalia Police Division participated in targeted enforcement with several peer law enforcement agencies in areas where there have been complaints of drug and criminal activity. This resulted in five felony drug arrests, two misdemeanor drug arrests, one search warrant issuance, and several other actions by the coalition. I have included Police and Fire statistic reports as enclosures.
- **12. Public Health:** Enclosed is a memorandum from the Ohio Department of Health, which rescinds some prior health mandates.
- **13. Mowing:** Weather and a lack of interest in part-time employment are weakening our team and contractors' prowess with regard to our battle against emerging weeds and tall grass. This appears to be an issue in several communities. The City has had frank discussion with contractors regarding expectations for maintenance of the public right of way.

Subject: Vandalia teamwork

On Wednesday, June 2, 2021, the Vandalia Police Communications Center received a call from a concerned citizen who found a young boy wandering alone along South Dixie Drive at East Alkaline Springs Road and was about ready to attempt to cross Dixie Drive by himself. Officer Joe Manning and Sergeant Todd Flynn responded and spoke with the boy to determine who he was, who his relatives were, and where he had wandered away from. The four-year old boy had limited knowledge about his parents and relatives and was unfamiliar to the area. He was also wet and cold from being out in the rain for some time. The officers knocked on several apartment doors within the nearby Villager Apartments and spoke with apartment management to see if he may have wandered away from one of the housing units, but no one in the apartments knew him. Officer Manning transported the boy, Raion, back to the police department to meet with a Children's Service caseworker to try and find who his family was and reunite him with them.

While waiting for CSB to arrive, Clerk Typist Nancy Anderson and Officer Andy Wehner provided Raion with some snacks and drink as well as a coloring book, stuffed animal and small toys to keep him occupied and comfortable in his environment. Officer Manning continued to attempt to gather additional information from Raion while at the police department. Sergeant Flynn requested the public safety specialists send out a teletype to area police agencies notifying them of Raion being found in case they had a missing person's complaint. Officer Wehner quickly put Raion's photograph and information on VPD's Facebook page in hopes of finding someone who might be able to identify him. I sent Raion's photograph and name to Superintendent Rob O'Leary who connected with his staff to see if Raion lived in the school district and/or had any siblings who might attend school, so we could locate his family. I notified Communications Manager Rich Hopkins of the situation and he began preparing a press release and media notification about Raion being located and our search for his relatives. I also spoke with Chief Follick about utilizing HyperReach for sending out a phone/text alert to find Raion's relatives.

After the VPD Facebook posting was made, it was shared hundreds of times and Amber Aivalotis-Weaver, administrator of the *All Things Vandalia* Facebook page, shared VPD's posting where it was viewed and shared numerous times. Chief Follick and Rich Hopkins were instrumental in activating HyperReach with a community message about Raion being found and asking the community to call VPD if they knew him. Public Safety Specialists Deborah Wright and Mindy Snodgrass were working in the Communications Center and fielded several calls from the public related to the incident and Raion. We had additional responses from community members seeking ways they could help Raion or the search for his relatives.

Within 15 minutes of the social media post and HyperReach notification, his aunt and mother were located and responded to the police department to reunite with Raion who had wandered away from his aunt's apartment while she was babysitting him and several other young children.

I was truly impressed with how everyone worked together and took a role to reunite four-year old Raion with his family after being lost outside in the rain. It was through the combined efforts of Officer Manning, Sergeant Flynn, Officer Wehner, Nancy Anderson, PSS Wright, PSS Snodgrass, Rich Hopkins, Chief Follick, Superintendent Rob O'Leary, and Amber Aivalotis-Weaver that we were successful in quickly locating Raion's family and reuniting him with his mother and aunt. I want to thank and recognize each of these individuals for their willingness to pitch in and help during a critical situation. Their efforts paid off and allowed us to return Raion safely to his family.

- Our Air Show preparations continue. Rich is about halfway done recruiting volunteers to assist in driving the shuttle vans and helping in the registration area at the Justice Center. We hope to get that wrapped up soon.
- We have been informed by Will Roberts at the Chamber that we will have six Grand
 Marshals for the Air Show Parade, each an inductee in the Ford Oval of Honor, which
 recognizes "common individuals who have demonstrated an uncommon commitment to
 serve and defend this country." The Mayor will be presenting each of the Grand
 Marshals with a key to the city in front of the grandstand area at the very beginning of
 the Friday, June 9, Air Show parade.

Re: Information Update - Period Ending June 11, 2021

- 1. YTD May 31, 2021, overall Income tax revenue is up 18.32% (\$1,262,241) from 2020. Withholding tax is up YTD 7.31% (\$402,302); individual tax up YTD 65.41% (\$383,523); Business net profit tax up YTD 59.73% (\$476,417). The amount of income tax revenue budgeted for 2021 is \$16,995,000. The amount collected YTD was \$8,151,839. Therefore, the amount collected to date (48%) in 2021 is approximately 6% higher than the estimated YTD amount based on the budget. However, due to the change in the income tax due dates in both 2020 and 2021, the monthly comparisons will be somewhat skewed until August.
- 2. Finance staff continue to provide the necessary information to the Auditor of State's Office regarding the 2020 audits for the City of Vandalia, Tri-Cities and NAWA, and to Lennon & Company, CPAs for the 2020 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report.
- 3. I participated in several webinars sponsored by the Ohio Municipal League, Ohio Government of Finance Officers Association, and the Office of Budget and Management. The main topic of discussion was the American Rescue Plan Act and preparation for receipt of funds and guidance on allowable expenditures.
- 4. Finance staff continue to attend various trainings on the new Incode Finance software, including the new time management system, Executime.
- 5. The tax office survived a successful (extended) tax season! Between April 1, 2021 and May 17, 2021, our office assisted 1,844 taxpayers at the counter, answered 835 phone calls, 300 emails, and 1,753 electronic returns. Congratulations and great job!!

SUBJECT: INFORMATION UPDATE – PERIOD ENDING JUNE 11, 2021

- The Vandalia Division of Fire received news this reporting period of Harrison Township Battalion Chief, Terry Overman's passing. Many Vandalia Division of Fire employees know or have worked with Chief Overman over the years. Vandalia Crews assisted Harrison Township Fire Dept during visitation and services and we extend our condolences to the family and friends of Chief Overman.
- 2. Due to Captain Stitzel's recent retirement, we have an opening within the Division of Fire for a shifted Fire Captain (shift commander). The open position with description was posted on the city's website and a link to apply until June 3, 2021. We will be moving forward to begin filling this vacancy.
- 3. The Fire Prevention Bureau has been providing training to the crews for a new initiative to have company level fire safety inspections. Starting on June 1st, Crews will be scheduling annual inspections around their special events and regular trainings. However, some inspections may need to be adjusted due to emergency responses.
- 4. The Division of Fire would like to congratulate all graduates especially our Aviators. It has been a challenging year for all, and we are proud of those who did such a great job.

DIVISION OF FIRE INFORMATION UPDATE

- 5. Memorial Day marked the two-year anniversary of the 2019 Memorial Day tornados that came through the area. The Division of Fire has taken this time to remind Vandalian's to have a disaster readiness plan in place in their homes. Any disaster plan should always include; 1.) registering for Hyper-Reach, and 2.) having a good understanding of how our outdoor weather warning systems work.
- 6. Our Hyper-Reach mass notification system was used to assist in the locating the family of a 4-year-old boy this past week would was found wondering in the area of Dixie and Alkaline Springs. The system sent messages (and a photo of the child) out making nearly 15,546 calls, 1361 emails, 6945 text messages, and 1361 social media notifications in just under 35 minutes.
- 7. On May 27th the Vandalia Lion's Club brought back their recognition dinner for Fire/EMS/Police officer of the year. This has always been a favorite event to honor public safety professionals. This year Mya Mitchell, Firefighter of the year and Matt Buker, EMS person of the year were recognized for their dedicated service to the community. Big thanks to the Lion's Club for this recognition event, it was always my favorite before COVID and it is now locked in as my favorite, as it is really the first "get together event" post COVID.

FACILITY MAINTENANCE DIVISION

- Maintenance staff did an outstanding job preparing Cassel Hills Swimming Pool for the swim season. They had a narrow window of time once the pool floor painting project was completed and when the pool needed filled. A coordinated effort was needed to bring equipment on line as they experienced issues with pumps, valves, boiler and plumbing with all being corrected in short order.
- Opportunities to spray for weed control have been minimal due to the recent wet weather. We were able to spray for weeds in the paver areas along National Road. Some of the Pear trees are suckering from the base and those were sprayed and removed as well.
- o The failed HVAC unit at the Clubhouse has been replaced. This unit controls the temperature in the snack bar, main counter and pro shop areas.
- Mowing continues to be a priority as the grass growth is being accelerated due to plenty of rain over the past several weeks. This creates a back log in our mowing schedule as our staff attempts to keep our grounds and facilities meeting community standards and expectations. An addition challenge we are encountering is a lack of interest in seasonal work of this nature. We continue to use social media and word of mouth to attempts to fill a couple of vacant seasonal maintainer positions.
- Maintenance staff is in the process of cleaning condenser coils. They are removing cottonwood and other debris that has collected on these HVAC components. Staff also assisted our contractor in completing building fire suppression system inspections.

RECREATION/ATHLETICS DIVISION

- The 32nd Vandalia Corporate Challenge has completed four days of activities to date. The event began on Sunday, Jun3 6 with Volleyball and Minute To Win It events and moved to Football Skills and Frisbee events on Monday. Tuesday events included basketball and soccer skill events with Wednesday events including Softball Skills and Golf Closest to the Pin. We have a total of nine business teams participating this year including Inteva Products, GE Aviation, GE Aviation TDI; Crossroads Rehab and Nursing Facility; Johnson Electric, Vandalia-Butler Schools, Waible Energy, Kentner Sellers CPA's and the City of Vandalia. The event runs through Friday evening, concluding with a spirited game of Trivia.
- Recreation Manager John Myers was notified by Dayton Public Health that a youth baseball player in our F-Major division tested positive for COVID. Public Health is recommending the players on the team quarantine for 2 weeks. They were exposed on June 5th and had practice on June 7 as well. No other players have shown symptoms at this point in time. Dayton Public Health is not recommending the opposing team

from the June 5 game quarantine due to limited exposure. The two week quarantine will run through this teams remaining scheduled games/tournament and therefore end the season for these youngsters.

- Cassel Hills Swimming Pool was scheduled to open on Saturday, May 29 but cool and rainy weather delayed opening day until Monday, May 31 (Memorial Day). The first week was rather slow due to the weather but picked up tremendously over this past weekend (June 4-6) as we experienced hot and humid weather. SwimSafe Pool Management has done an outstanding job managing the operations of the facility to this point in time.
- Recreation Superintendent Jeff Kreill is working with Bill McIntire of the Dayton Metro Library to provide our community additional Little Free Libraries in several of our parks. We currently have a Little Free Library at the Sports Complex, just outside the VRC along the walking path. Little Free Library is a 501 nonprofit organization that promotes neighborhood book exchanges, usually in the form of a public bookcase. I placed a picture of the current Sports Complex unit at the end of this document.

RECREATION CENTER

- Activity at the Recreation Center continues to increase. We experienced a huge increase in non-resident daily admissions during the past week as people are learning the facility is back open for non-resident usage.
 Also, the VRC hit a record high for daily visits for the year 601 visits on June 2.
- Our VRC Paint and Sip class took place on May 22 with 10 adults participating. Studio 14 from Troy
 presented the class, which included the painting of a picture and a drink from the Juicing Jammers Mobile
 Juice Bar.
- The VRC hosted our first Food Truck Wednesday event on June 9. McNasty's Great Food Truck was onsite during the lunch hour with attendance better than anticipated due to the rainy weather. The schedule for the remaining Wednesdays in June is: June 16 Claybourne Grille; June 23 Lilia's Outside Café; June 30 Roll On In Food Truck. Make plans to stop by between 11:30 and 1:30 to grab a delicious lunch and enjoy the park on these dates.
- CampRec is now in the second week and is going very smoothly. Most days are sold out with 50 kids each day. Kudos to Aaron Messenger and his Camp Counselor staff for their efforts to offer a safe and affordable summer camp for local children.

GOLF DIVISION

- Thus far the month of June has been very wet at the golf course. The Optimist Outing was rained out on June 2 and has been rescheduled for June 14. Leagues have been dodging rain drops as well with 7 league dates being postponed due to weather thus far in June.
- The rainy start to the month has seen collections of greens fees and carts drop by \$9,000 from the start of June, 2019.
- O Golf Superintendent Marty Szturm cut a tree down on the right side of #8 fairway. This tree has been dying the past few years and was becoming an eyesore.

SENIOR CITIZENS CENTER

- o The Senior Center returned to normal operations on June 2 as allowed by the Governor's lasted COVID orders.
- Toni Williams attended a webinar presented by Montgomery County Jobs and Family Services that explained the process for using E-Cimpact software. This completes the necessary requirements for the 2021-2022 Van Tran contract.

Subject: Information Update Ending June 11, 2021

- 1. During the past two weeks, VPD officers made 45 traffic stops on commercial motor vehicles for traffic violations. These stops resulted in 5 traffic citations, 38 written warnings and 2 verbal warnings while working 48 additional enforcement hours.
- 2. CPO Andrew Wehner along with school crossing guards held a "thank you" party for all third-grade students of Demmitt and Helke Elementary Schools who participated in the Safety Patrol Program throughout the year. The event was held at Skateworld and were treated to a pizza lunch. A boy and girl student from each school was randomly selected to win a new bicycle.
- 3. CPO Wehner placed laminated placards in each marked patrol vehicle to assist officers during interactions with persons who are hearing impaired. The placards have pictures to point at to communicate with one another.
- 4. The Ohio Attorney General's Office is revamping the statewide eOPOTA online course. Officer Wehner was selected as one of the officers across the state to test and evaluate the new website. Officers Wehner completed over 220 checks of the system and reported back to the AG's Office. The new system is user and mobile friendly.
- 5. Detectives charged a 34-year-old Vandalia man with Aggravated Possession of Drugs (Methamphetamine). This incident stems from a disorderly conduct at a residence and the male was found to be in possession of a glass pipe that contained methamphetamine.
- 6. On May 24, Detective Fraley, CPO Wehner, and Lt. Walker hosted a presentation for the local chapter of a community group known as "The Armed Lady." The Armed Lady is a ladies-only shooting organization offering women the opportunity to learn more about shooting sports, self-defense and personal protection. The presentation covered topics on CCW laws and a demonstration of the MILO range simulator. After the demonstration, the ladies had the opportunity to complete skills building drills on the simulator.
- 7. We want to congratulate Captain Duane Stitzel on his retirement from the Division of Fire and wish him the very best success in his next endeavor.

- 8. I attended the Grievance Hearing information webinar for all department directors on May 26 and found it informative, covering the various procedures for handling employee grievances.
- Detectives charged a 56-year old Vandalia man with two counts of rape and one count of compelling prostitution after a female was dropped off at a fuel station in Vandalia from the Troy area and later was picked up by the suspect by chance.
- 10. On June 2, I attended the Montgomery County Officer Memorial committee meeting to discuss plans and logistics for a September ceremony to honor our fallen officers. This ceremony was postponed from May due to the pandemic restrictions. This year's ceremony will be held on Monday, September 27 at 11:00 am at Riverscape in downtown Dayton with two names of fallen officers being added to the Roll Call.
- 11. On June 2, Vandalia officers responded to North Dixie Drive and East Alkaline Springs Road for a four-year old boy found wandering alone and attempting to cross North Dixie Drive by himself. Officers searched the area for a relative or sitter who might be familiar with the boy but were unsuccessful. VPD posted the boy's photo on social media and the City sent out a Hyper-Reach message to locate the relatives or caretaker. After more than two hours, we heard from family members and his aunt and mother responded to the Justice Center to pick him up. The aunt, a 27-year old Vandalia resident, was charged with Child Endangering after he wandered away from her apartment with her being unaware he was gone.
- 12. On June 4, Officer Robert Large and Detective Mike Hulbert participated in a "Drug Free" targeted enforcement detail. These events involve a collaborated effort from law enforcement agencies in Montgomery County to combat drug-related complaints. By participating in these activities, we have access to extensive resources from all over the County. The results of this targeted enforcement included five felony drug arrests, two misdemeanor drug arrests, one arrest for weapons violation, one arrest for drug paraphernalia, a misdemeanor arrest, three K-9 sniffs and a search warrant conducted as a result of a traffic stop
- 13. Detectives charged a 17-year-old Vandalia resident with two counts of Misuse Use of a Credit Card and petty theft out of an incident that occurred at Subway (312 E National Rd) on March 23. The juvenile bought credit information off the Internet and used that information to purchase items without having to pay for them.
- 14. Public Safety Specialists Mindy Snodgrass, Deborah Wright and Haley Rue successfully recertified in Emergency Medical Dispatch. This renewal takes place every two years. The PSS are required to maintain at least a 90% on their quality reviews, complete at least 24 hours of continuing education and score at least an 80% on a recertification test to be eligible for recertification.
- 15. Several VPD employees enjoyed participating in this year's Corporate Challenge events held at the Sports Complex and various locations throughout the city. We appreciate the opportunity to enjoy the fun that comes from team building games and challenges that accompany the Corporate Challenge. Special recognition to Steve Clark and all the Parks & Recreation staff for making this a fun and exciting event!
- 16. I attended the bi-monthly executive board meeting for the Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police on June 9 held at the Dublin Police Department. It was great to

- resume meeting in person with the other police chiefs from across Ohio and conduct our organization's business impacting the policing profession.
- 17. As a reminder, we are hosting a blood drive at the Justice Center on Friday, June 18 from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm. Our goal is 40 participants so we can support the Community Blood Center which is experiencing a shortage of supply. Public Works

Crews have finished up for this spring forming up and pouring foundations for headstones at Poplar Hill Cemetery. Eleven more foundations were poured for headstones. We also performed three more burials during this reporting period.

We performed water shut offs for delinquent customers for the month of May. We had 56 customers on the list this month.

We repaired as watermain break on Kenneth Avenue. This had been a small leak for a while bit we were able to locate and make repairs

We also made several repairs to fire hydrants that were discovered during this year's fire hydrant flushing program.

Crews have been out on the non-rain days spraying for weed control along the gutters on our roadways.

Crew have also been making repairs to several catch basins on the streets we will be resurfacing later this year.

We took advantage of a couple rain days to do some in house water distribution training for some of our newer technicians.

Steve Clark, Rudy Well, Steve Nickels, Mike Busse and I met at the Art Park to formulate a plan and cost estimate to pave the pathways through park.

Steve Nickels and I attended the Tri Cities Wastewater Authority Technical Committee meeting on June 9^{th} and the NAWA Technical Committee meeting on June 2^{nd} .

Steve Nickels, Bridgette Leiter, you and I met with representatives from SUEZ about our water meter program. Our existing system in nearing the end of its service life and we are exploring options for an upgrade to an Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) program that would be similar to our water tower maintenance program.

Development & Engineering Services

The weather has delayed the contractor in beginning our concrete repair program. He has indicated that they anticipate to begin some of the saw cutting next week and the removal and replacement the following week. The completion date for the concrete work is July 30th.

I received notification Thursday June 10th that the Traffic Signal Poles and Mast Arms for Northwoods Boulevard and Falls Creek Drive are to be shipped out next week. Installation should take a couple weeks and the signal will be put into service.

We opened bid for the Helke Road Watermain work and Street Reconstruction on May 27th. Eight contractors submitted bids for the project. We will have a recommendation for award of the contract at the June 21 Council Meeting.

I have received a proposal from Rumpke for a two-year extension to our existing Refuse and Recycling Collection Contract. We will have this information ready for presentation to City Council at their June 21 Study Session.

You, Amber and I conducted second round interviews with five candidates for our City Planner position. This is an exciting time for a new Planner to come on board and help promote and preserve the great things going on in our City.

You, Amber and I also met with staff from the Montgomery County TID regarding different developments around the City and the Airport. We also discussed the ongoing US40 project and future roadway projects surrounding the Airport.

Our Right of Way mowing contractor encountered some staffing issues in getting started this year. We have met with them to re-enforce the importance of keeping up with the terms of our agreement. Since then, there service has improved but we will continue to monitor closely.

Enforced mowing has also been an ongoing effort to keep up with. We have had our contractor mow and we have invoiced ten different properties in the last two weeks.

The building department continues to very busy with new projects coming in every day. Items of note are:

- 1. A building permit was issued for Life Stance Health at 7250 Poe Avenue Suite #220.
- 2. A Temporary Certificate of Occupancy was issued for a small area of offices for Heraeus at 970 Industrial Park.
- 3. Plan were submitted on June 10th for the new Culvers at 6425 Miller Lane.
- 4. Ted Baker attended the Ohio Board of Building Standards appeal hearing for the electromagnetic locking system of exit doors for Axogen at 913 Industrial Park Drive.




CALLS FOR SERVICE (1645)

The Division of Fire responded on $\underline{301}$ calls for service in May ($\underline{207}$ EMS calls and $\underline{94}$ fire calls). An average of approximately ten $\underline{10}$ calls for service per day.



A statistic that we can track now is how many of our calls for service overlapped (or occurred simultaneously) during this evaluation period. In May, we had 83 calls for service that overlapped, approximately 28% of the call volume.

Crews responded to 301 calls for service in May the chart below outlines call types (Report 553):



The Major Incident Types in May were (% of the total call volume/month):

- 1. Rescue & Emergency Medical Calls (69%) All the Division of Fire Emergency Medical calls including any motor vehicle/pedestrian accident (with/without injuries) and/or any technical rescue response.
- 2. Good Intent Calls (9%) Smoke scares, steam/fog mistaken for smoke, false alarms not malicious.
- Customer Service Calls (15%) These are calls for service where fire crews are directly
 assisting a customer with a specific issue/problem (i.e., strange odors, smoke
 detector/CO detector installations and/or battery change outs, etc.).
- 4. Fire Alarm Calls (4%) This type call includes malfunctioning fire alarms, intentional/unintentional false alarms, or calls where someone called to report an issue that turned out to not be an emergency (illegal burning, smells/sight of smoke or fire, or steam confused for smoke).
- 5. Fires (2%) Crews responded to three, dollar loss fires in May. Dollar loss for May was \$110,500.00.
- 6. Hazardous Condition (2%) These are calls for service where fire crews are responding to natural gas/CO investigations, fuel/oil spills, and/or arching or downed electrical lines.

MUTUAL AID/JOINT RESPONSE DATA (1616 & 1754)

In May, the Division of Fire provided mutual aid on TEN (10) occasions and we received mutual aid on twelve (12) occasions.







Turnout Times Fire Calls For Service By Fire Stations






Average Turnout Time by Shift






SHIFT	AVERAGE TURNOUT TIME as MM: SS (Dispatch to en-route)




SHIFT	AVERAGE RESPONSE TIME (min) (Dispatch to Arrive)


CALLS FOR SERVICE BY DISTRICT (Report 972)







SUBJECT: Executive Director's Report

The 2021 show is just one-month away...only 16 business days to show week! I wanted to provide you with an update on where things stand as we head into the final stretch:

- 1. Overall, everything is going fairly well given what we've been through this past year and a late transition to a normal show program. We do have some issues we are working through.
- 2. Sponsorship sales are good. We only lost two sponsors out of 16, GE Aviation and L3. Sales to date total \$376,500. This is about \$75k below normal due to the two losses. Good support in a year full of uncertainty and change.
- 3. Chalet sales are good as well. Saturday has one unit not occupied and Sunday five units out of 54 total units at available. Better outcome than expected and more may be sold..
- 4. Pavilion sales are the same as the 2019 Thunderbird show. Sales are \$102,033 to date. Great progress for sales to be the same as a normal year with such a late start.
- 5. Blue Sky Chalet sales are doing well too. Sales are \$148,128 or 10% below 2019 at this time. Demand seems strong so we may reach a normal level by show time.
- 6. Kroger discount tickets went on sale June 1st. This is one of our bestselling ticket products.
- 7. Chairman's Club has about half the tables sold, not bad and they tend to sell late in the cycle.
- 8. Marketing is getting underway in all media i.e., TV, radio, outdoor, print and social. Our 15 second TV spots will hit the air today.
- 9. Financially, we feel we still have a good chance of meeting our net income projection of \$133,319. It's a very dynamic situation though as we work through many changes and issues.
- 10. For example, rental car costs will increase about 100% or more due to the post-pandemic business environment, we have lost the 35-jet team courtesy vehicles from Joseph Airport Toyota and now have to rent most of them. Dealers have low inventory due to shutdowns.
- 11. Rental car insurance costs have risen dramatically too as many underwriters are getting out of rental car insurance due to high losses being experienced. We're working through this problem.

- 12. Like most small businesses in the country, we are experiencing labor problems. Due to the governments "free money" policy many people are staying home and drawing unemployment. Literally all our vendors (tents, catering, busing, etc.) cannot find help. This is impacting our ability to get shuttle buses too.
- 13. One major problem is the loss of our long-time South Parking lot. Construction of a lot west of the former location on the Airport Operations Area (AOA) proposed has many issues. It requires placement and removal of over 6,000' of fence, significant security and is not consumer friendly with long walks and less access. This is a serious problem going forward.
- 14. We just learned yesterday we are unable to secure shuttle buses for the South Lot. As a result, we are expanding use of the main lot to the east, using space in and around McCauley Drive/ Expo Center and space on the Center One Ramp. This is an unfortunate development but we have no other options and will get through it. Due to the lack of shuttles, it effectively takes away the South lot replacement problem we have been working diligently on this year.
- 15. We dodged a bullet! After receiving state approval for a normal show, on May 11th TSA extended their mask mandate on airports.(intended for public transportation) that would have required everyone at the show to wear a face mask. It looked bleak but TSA Columbus miraculously received an exemption from TSA Washington. Great work by all involved.
- 16. After a year and a half of work we finally have an FAA approved Air Show Operations Manual (AOM) in compliance with the new regulations. Dayton is one of the first in the country! We received are approved flying waiver from Cincinnati FAA Flight Standards yesterday.
- 17. Some very good news. We thought since the military was cancelling most of their air shows this year and government pandemic fear, we would not get many military statics. I'm pleased to report we have had incredible success in recruiting military and other static aircraft. Here's a list of the 43 aircraft you will likely see on static display at the 2021 show:
